
BOWLING THEM OVER

TOWN HALL REOPENS



A 25-YEAR lease with City of Edinburgh Council on Portobello Town Hall runs from 1st June this year, so the building is now entirely the responsibility of the group of volunteers who run Portobello Central SCIO, just a few weeks short of four years since it was closed.

Bookings have been rolling in since March, running well into 2024, including a grand ball for Porty Pride on 9th July. The recent highly successful Crowdfunder appeal enabled the appointment of a venue manager who will make bookings easy: for parties, markets, music and dance. The first actual event will take place in late June and, as when taking over an old house, there's a lot of work still to be done.

Now that the outside is wind and water-tight, a lot of inside preparation needs to be done: exploring, cleaning, sorting, testing and paperwork, for which more volunteers are needed. They will play a big part in the venue's success, which will make it even more part of the community than before. To book an event or offer to help, contact: hello@ portobellocentral.org

The building of the Town Hall was part of the agreement made with the Edinburgh city council when Portobello was amalgamated into the city in 1896. It opened on 30th October 1914. The swimming baths on the Promenade were agreed at the same time.

RICHARD WISEMAN

PORTOBELLO is home Britain's only Professor of the Public Understanding of Psychology, Richard Wiseman. With over two



million subscribers and 500 million views on his YouTube channel, and having written several best-selling books, Richard is internationally renowned for his research, including magic, the paranormal, superstition and luck.

Born in Luton, Richard became interested in magic at a young age and then took a degree in psychology at University College London. A chance meeting with a friend resulted in him coming to Edinburgh University to study for a PhD in magic and the paranormal at the Koestler Parapsychology Unit. Here he met his future partner, Caroline Watt, now the Professor of Parapsychology at the University.


Following his PhD, Richard went to work at the University of Hertfordshire, where he currently continues with his research, teaching and talks. His interest in the paranormal has led him to conduct lots of strange studies, including teaming up with the Edinburgh Science Festival to investigate ghostly experiences at Edinburgh's Underground Vaults!

Richard and Caroline bought a flat on the Prom in 2020 and enjoy a magnificent sea view. They love living in the area, with Richard explaining that "research shows that being by the sea boosts wellbeing, the area has a wonderful sense of community and it's a great place to watch the world go by".



"In the early 1900s, thousands of people flocked to the seaside and local magicians like Andre Letta and Harry Marvello became household names." 



Summer 2023 - 4 -



IF YOU lost plants during the winter, treat yourself to something new, but try to ensure any new plants have been grown in peat-free compost. I've used it for decades, but you do need to watch the watering as some retains water almost too well. A finger poked into the compost will tell you how wet it is. Add more drainage such as perlite or sharp sand if required.

Container plants will need a feed and comfrey or nettle tea is easy to make. Collect leaves in a bucket, cover with water and leave for four weeks, then dilute to the colour of weak tea before use. Although expensive to buy, I also use seaweed liquid if I know I'll have visitors, as the homemade liquid does stink.

Remember to deadhead throughout the summer, especially annuals like marigolds and cosmos, perennials like dahlias and bedding like verbena.

Keep sowing a pinch of lettuce, carrots or peas every fortnight to ensure a continuous supply without a glut, but if you do have extra, a food bank will welcome fresh veg.

Our garden at 39 Nantwich Drive will open under Scotland's Garden Scheme from 2-5pm on Saturday and Sunday, 5th and 6th August. Funds to SGS and Garden Organic. No wheelchair access. £5 entrance fee.

THE apple blossom in the community orchard has been resplendent and points to another bumper harvest. The seasonal glut needs to be managed and one way is the production



of Portobello apple juice. Another is pickling the apples as chutney, which is then sold on the PEDAL stall at the monthly market in Brighton Place, on the first Saturday of the month from 9.30am to 1.30pm.

The market supports the council initiative of a 20-minute neighbourhood where, by travelling on foot or by bike, local services can meet most of our needs. For example, Portobello Community Fridge collects most of its food by cargo bike. Also, did anyone catch the news about Portobello resident, Professor Jim Scobbie, who has ditched his car and now commutes to Queen Margaret University by e-bike?

Not all of us want to totally eliminate the car for all travel but we can walk and cycle more and we must preserve our good bus connections. Personally, I think we should push for a tram extension along Seafield to Portobello during the Masterplan consultation that is being developed. How about it?

HOW much do you spend on clothes? Chances are you are spending more than you need to. The fashion industry is reliant on people buying new clothes every season - but in the middle of a cost of living crisis, that is unsustainable.

Try buying secondhand. There are plenty of charity shops in Portobello and most clothing sold is in very good condition, clean and a fraction of the price of new items.

Mending clothing is a good way to get some more life out of your garments. Try darning socks and jumpers (there are YouTube videos to help you). Local dressmakers can repair damaged clothes or even turn them into something different if you ask them. A good cobbler can resole your shoes and help you revitalise your footwear. Fed up with the colour of that top? Try dying it to change the colour into something you'd rather wear.

Army and Navy stores used to be a common sight on high streets, selling ex-military clothing at knockdown prices. You can find these online now, selling everything from underwear to raincoats much of it never issued.




PORTY COMMUNITY BIKE LIBRARY

IT IS 20 years since the nostalgic Golden Days event, a celebration of long, hot summer days and crowds on the beach. There was a lot happening with "Fun for Everyone on the Prom & Beach". The accuracy of the programme map is questionable, as the Bedford House Hotel, later the Dalriada, has been marked east of Morton Street.

Bill Barclay, a well-known comedian of that era, performed for an hour at 'The Old Pier'. Radio Forth (Forth 2) had an outside broadcast on the prom featuring music from the 40s and 50s from 2 til 5.30pm. Later, they hosted The Golden Days Show: A musical



EDCH met MSPs at the Scottish Parliament in April to highlight the growing issue of pet poverty. The event was hosted by MSP Christine Grahame, a keen advocate of the Home's work. As well as more owners using pet food banks, there have been a record number of calls to the Home from owners about surrendering their pets – a total of 526 over 6 months. AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

PROPITIOUS mid-April sunshine favoured Portobello Amnesty International Group's annual Book Sale and Coffee Morning at Bellfield. Home baking was devoured, books changed hands and patrons were serenaded al fresco by a folk band, with an admirable £862 raised – some £100 more than last year – to help the essential global work of Amnesty International.

In the meantime, the Portobello Group continues to do what we can to assist in that work and local support is frequently heartening. Our stall at May's Portobello Market, for instance, attracted an encouraging 180 petition signatures in support of Zhanargul Zhumatai, a Kazakh artist and activist, currently detained for the second time without trial by the Chinese authorities for campaigning on local authority corruption and the land rights of Kazakh herding communities.

As a manifestation of plain human decency such a response is heart-warming – and honourable mention must go particularly to the doughty bunch of Towerbank P6-ers who grabbed some of our petition sheets and hared round the market, gleaning numerous signatures for Zhanargul's case from stallholders and others.

ONE swallow may not make a summer, but there's no doubt this showy, streamer-tailed acrobat signifies warmer days ahead. By the time the (unrelated) swifts join them, higher up, screeching an announcement of their presence, you can be sure it's not far off having to reach for the sunscreen.

However I have to confess that there's an underdog cousin of the swallow that I find myself scanning the blue skies for. I have a whole Caravan of Love for the house martin

A touch smaller than a swallow, the effect is accentuated by the lack

of tail streamers, its tail instead a stubby wedge. From above it is a dark metallic blue, with a white rump patch, while underneath, as it turns hunting small flying insects, it flicks the light switch, showing a perfect white body.

They bring to mind small fighter jets, a little delta shape carving the sky. As the name suggests they are strongly associated with people, migrating every year from Africa, and building nests out of mud under the eaves of houses.

They have in the past been falsely accused of trapping



sparrows inside those mud nests, sealing the entrance when the intruder seeks to destroy or take over the nest; but overall they lack the myth and legend of their fellow summer travellers (though five did appear on Richard II's coat of arms).

Look for them over water especially, though they'll happily seek their prey over gardens, where the BBQs and G&Ts being indulged in definitely do make a summer.
