WASTE TRANSFER PROPOSAL GOES TO APPEAL

VIRIDOR Waste Management have appealed against the Council's decision, in August 2008, to refuse their planning application for a waste transfer plant on the former freightliner terminal on Sir Harry Lauder Road. The case will now be decided at a Public Local Inquiry (PLI) which will start on Tuesday 1st December.

PONGS, the campaign group against the proposal, believe one of the main arguments against it is the anticipated extra traffic: Viridor's planning application indicated that there would be 928 HGV movements in and out of the site every day, which PONGS believe would lead to increased congestion and air pollution, and lorries queuing along the Portobello bypass. Viridor's traffic study omitted the Seafield and Milton Link

junctions, and was carried out before the bus priority traffic lights scheme replaced the Seafield roundabout.

The proposal is for a residual waste transfer plant for commercial and industrial waste, not domestic waste, to be trucked in from a wide area. PONGS are concerned that it would lead to a severe loss of amenity resulting from traffic congestion, air pollution, light pollution, noise, smell and vermin, and would be detrimental to the adjacent conservation area.

PONGS estimate that they need to raise at least £20,000 to pay for expert witnesses at the PLI. Portobello Community Council and Portobello Amenity Society have both pledged £1,000 to the fund, and PCATS have been approached for a similar donation from funds left over from

the superstore inquiry. "If anyone objects to this, please send an e-mail to pcatsinfo@ googlemail.com before 30th June", asks PCATS treasurer Karen MacLean.

The group are planning a series of fund-raising events, such as Porty's Got Talent, their own version of the popular TV show, coffee mornings and raffles. More information will appear on posters locally and on the campaign website www.portobellopongs.com

"If every household in close proximity to the site donated at least £20, we would have enough money to pay for the experts", said PONGS spokesperson Maria Devoy. "If you would like to donate, please send a cheque made out to P.O.N.G.S., c/o 12 West Brighton Crescent, Edinburgh, EH15 1LU".

80 YEARS OF TODDLERS HUT

PORTOBELLO Toddlers Hut Playgroup celebrates its 80th anniversary this year, and is believed to be the longest-running independent childcare service in Britain.

It was set up in 1929, as a playground, by a group of local women who held whist drives and bridge parties to raise funds, then two years later the committee raised more money to build the hut that is still used today. The playgroup provided care for under-privileged children, allowing their mothers to go out to work, perhaps even to cook and clean for the women who opened the premises.

'The Hut' is an important part of the local community, with generations of families passing through it themselves and returning with their own children and grandchildren. Many people also remember it being used as a lost children and first aid post during the summers when people flocked to Portobello for their annual holiday.

Today the Toddlers Hut is registered to care for children aged from 2½ to 5 years, providing up-to-date childcare in a modernised environment. The service meets all Care Commission and SSSC standards and requirements and receives positive inspection reports. Morning sessions are run on Monday to Friday, and three afternoon sessions per week were recently introduced to help meet the high demand for places.

PROFILE PORTY No.

CLAUDIA Pottier can be found planting, pruning and planning at Dr Neil's garden in Duddingston. Born in London, Claudia had a busy childhood and attended nine schools in north and east London. Her love of gardening was inspired by summer holidays spent at her great-aunt's home in Dorset, where she was entrusted with dead-heading pansies violas.

Later, as a freelance dancer she often worked away from home, but kept an allotment to satisfy a passion for gardening.

On one tour she met and fell in love with a Scottish dancer, which prompted a move to Joppa for the couple. Claudia has now been living in the area for the past 15 years and says: "Portobello has been a great place to bring up my three children. It's friendly and human, nothing is too precious."

When her daughter was a year old, Claudia switched to a career in horticulture. This involved a juggling act, she remembers, taking her baby into Oatbridge College when childcare plans fell through. Her daughter is now twelve years old and clearly takes after her mother, as she is training to be a ballet dancer in Glasgow. Claudia also has two sons, the elder studying Urban Design and the younger teaching skateboarding.

On graduation Claudia worked as a freelance gardener, then a meeting with the founders of Dr Neil's Garden led to an opportunity to work there one day a week. She eventually took over the garden full-time when the Neils could no longer manage. After a decade, her contribution to the beautiful garden has come to fruition. She says: "I can now see part of me reflected in the garden as the planting has reached maturity and, since I have been growing it organically, there are many more varieties of birds and insects."

Claudia also has a local allotment where she grows fruit, vegetables and lots of flowers. "Picking a favourite is difficult", she says, but auriculars are top of her list and are displayed in a theatre made by her partner.

For the moment, all her future plans rest in Dr Neil's Garden, where she says she can be found apparently staring into the middle distance, spade in hand, but actually thinking hard about new projects. The latest is an unusual knot garden using native myrtle, which flowers and has a wonderful scent. "I am the type of gardener who waits for the ground to give me inspiration rather than the other way round", she says. Karen Coombe

AWARD FOR LOCAL TRADERS



DURING Fair Trade Fortnight in February/March, Jim and Morag Baird of the Just World Shop, 54 Portobello High Street, won the overall prize in the Lord Provost's Awards as part of the Edinburgh Fair Trade City initiative. Morag and Jim have run the Just World Shop and supplied the growing number of local stalls for nearly 18 years, well before fair trade became trendy. Jim has also given dozens of talks in local schools.

FLOOD PREVENTION WORK IN PROGRESS

WORK is in progress on flood defences behind the cottages in Adelphi Place. A new bypass culvert (underground tunnel) will link into the existing network that runs under Portobello High Street and, during heavy rainfall, will divert any excess water in the Figgate Burn away from the cottages. The defences are designed to mitigate the effects of the big storm that may take place once in 200 years, and the system's capacity has been increased by 12% to also take account of any potential increase in flooding caused by climate change.

The excavation, which is 5m deep, 5m wide and 230m long will be dug in phases and the work is expected to be completed by the end of this year. Landscaping will be re-instated in early 2010.

The work is being carried out for the Council by Carillion Civil Engineering. Stakeholder Manager, Stuart Mackay, is happy to answer any concerns or enquiries on 07779 585 762. Stuart will be making a presentation on the scheme to the Portobello Community Council meeting on 29th June.

ACTION ON THE ENVIRONMENT

GREEN

PEDAL has several groups working on different themes (for more details see www.pedal-porty.org.uk). The Food Group has been working to create a community orchard (just off Gilbertstoun, opposite the footbridge at Brunstane Station) and has finally got a lease from the Council, who also cleared the site for us. We planted several trees and fruit bushes on our first workday, and are expecting to end up with about 30 trees, a willow plantation for withies, a soft fruit area, and a medicinal herb garden. BTCV, a voluntary organisation, also helped with clearing work and will create steps and a path to make the orchard accessible to all. We're planning several workdays over the summer, and a midsummer party too.

The orchard is part of PEDAL's plans to create opportunities for local people to grow more food locally. We're currently mapping local land that isn't being used, including gardens whose owners would like to share them. This could lead to a garden sharing scheme, more allotments being created, or a 'patchwork urban farm' where several sites are worked to a plan. Another possibility is to bulk-buy fruit trees to sell at cost price and create a 'virtual' orchard in front gardens. We also hope to develop a regular local market for new and existing businesses.

Unfortunately, despite our best efforts, PEDAL hasn't secured funding for the Portobello Transition Hub. The fund we applied to was hugely oversubscribed and most of the money went to areas of greater deprivation.

HEALTHY EATING: IRISH SODA BREAD This bread is quick and easy to make, as no rising is needed, and is delicious with

soup, cheese or spread with jam. It also freezes well.

1lb (500g) wholemeal flour

5oz (150g) strong white flour

2oz (50g) oatmeal (optional)

1½ teasp. bicarb.soda

1½ teasp. salt

16-20 fl oz (400-600 ml) of sour milk, or fresh milk soured with juice of ½ a

First set the oven to gas mark 7, 427°F (220°C). Mix the dry ingredients well. Add 16 fl oz of the milk at first, then gradually more until you have a soft (but not wet) dough. Knead briefly then form into a round about 1" (2.5cm) deep and place on a greased baking sheet. Mark with a cross and bake in the centre of the oven for 35-45 mins, until the crust is golden brown.

Cool on a wire rack for at least 30 mins before eating, wrapped in a tea towel if you prefer a softer crust.

HANDY HINTS

CAMPING HINTS: Take a supply of lids to use as candle holders.

If you run out of ice to cool your beer, put each can in a wet sock and hang from a branch.

Eat plenty of garlic, and marmite sandwiches, not necessarily at the same time, to ward off midges.

Make matches waterproof by dipping ends in wax.

Clean thermos bottle by dropping in an Alka-Seltzer tablet, fill with water and soak for an hour.

GENERAL HINTS: Smelly trainer trouble? Fill socks with cat litter, baking soda, crumpled newspaper or tea leaves. Tie the ends and put them into the trainers to absorb odours.

To stop ice cream dripping out of the bottom of the cone, pop in a mini marshmallow before the ice-cream.

To keep ants out of the house, find out where they are coming in and sprinkle a barrier of cinnamon or ground pepper to block their way.

Put newspapers under passengers to help prevent travel sickness, under a bowl of bread dough to help it rise, and under a laver of kitchen roll in the fridge to keep vegetables fresh.

Add 1/4 tsp. bicarbonate of soda to a pan of potatoes while mashing, for fluffy results.

SOME credit crunch money-saving tips. Working in the garden, rather than going to the gym, will save on fees and, as long as you warm up and cool down, you'll build the three Ss - stamina, strength and suppleness. Save time by shopping locally for seeds, etc. instead of a journey to a DIY shed and save transport miles as well.

Organic gardening advocates healthy soil first, so there's no need to buy insecticides, herbicides or artifical fertilisers. Make your own fertliser - when comfrey or nettles are vigorously growing, cut them and make a compost tea. Pernicious weeds (horsetail, docks, hairy bittercress) can be added to the compost heap if they are first put in a bucket of water for a few weeks until dead. Plants infested with greenfly or other nasties benefit from hanging bird feeders close by; the birds will devour your pests while awaiting their turn at the feeder.

Gardening is a slow process, so don't be in a hurry and don't feel overwhelmed. Split the garden into little sections, if only in your head, and concentrate on finishing one piece. A bit every day achieves more than too much at the weekend, and with the longer lighter evenings you could do a bit after work. If you're not feeling up to a major weeding task, go round the garden and pull out only those you dislike most; next time you look out of the window they won't offend the eye so much.

Once shrubs have finished flowering take out one in three branches right down to the base and shred them, or, if there are only a few, cut into 6cm lengths. Use them as a mulch to stop weeds growing around plants that are just getting established, or between perennials to save weeding. New perennials need to be protected or they get swamped and don't thrive. I've lost many small plants this way, often expensive unusual ones. I mulch after it has rained and use soaked newspaper, even old woollen blankets or downie covers, topped with the mulch.

Clear weeds between paving. I love the Mexican daisy between paving but sometimes I get the odd dandelion. I use an old bread knife, whose long blade makes using it as a lever very effective. After all that work, remember to take time to just look....and enjoy.

We've decided not to open our garden this year as, although the front is finished the side hasn't been decided on - so many options: herb, kitchen, courtyard garden, pond, fountain? We hope to open again next year.



THOMSON'S TO

THOMSON'S Tower is a unique octagonal building located behind Duddingston Kirk, in Dr Neil's Garden, on the shores of Duddingston Loch. It was designed by the famous Edinburgh architect William Henry Playfair and built in 1825 by Duddingston Curling Society as their curling house. It was named after the Reverend John Thomson, minister of Duddingston Kirk from 1805-1840, a famous landscape artist, who used the tower as a studio.



The building is historically important, as it was here that Duddingston Curling Society wrote the rules of curling which are still used throughout the world.

The tower consists of a lower and upper chamber and has recently been restored by Dr Neil's Garden Trust with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund, Historic Scotland, The National Trust for Scotland and others. The lower chamber is a small museum of curling, and the upper chamber gives the history of the tower and garden, and its associations with Playfair, Thomson and curling.

The tower is open to the public each weekend during July and August from 1-4pm. Entrance: Adults £2, children £1, family ticket £5. The upper chamber is available for hire for small functions, recitals or as a studio: Tel. 07849187995. Jim Baird

BOOK REVIEW: 155 Years of Golf in Portobello

IT is very rare for a book on local history, intended for what can only be called a niche market, to be produced to such high standards as this history of Portobello Golf Club. Czeslaw, commonly known as Chester, Kruk and his Polish publishers have brought out a volume whose stylish hardback covers enclose 96 top-quality, glossy pages that do full justice to the text and lavish illustrations. There is also a three-page index, which is an invaluable and necessary asset in a work that has to mention so many individuals, such as Club Captains and trophy winners.

Chester provides a brief history of Portobello's development and describes how the golf club was founded in 1856 by its civic leaders when the burgh had its own Town Council. Thomas Wood, Major Hugh Christian and Alexander Brand, all Provosts of Portobello at various times, were to the fore in club affairs. (Is it just a coincidence that Brand Drive in the Christian housing estate is so close to the tricky second hole?).

Quite rightly, there are chapters devoted to the club's Ladies Section, which has its own distinguished history going back to 1893, and to Willie Hare who was Club Secretary for over two decades. All in all, this book should be on the shelves of everyone who has played, or just walked, around the attractive little course in Stanley Street.

RETIRED TEACHER FUNDS EDUCATION FOR NEPALI CHILDREN IN INDIA

NEPALI children are benefiting from the dedication of retired teacher Pauline MacInnes of Moira Terrace. Her charity, the Himalayan Children Education Trust, funds teachers in the Kalimpong Hill region of West Bengal.

She first went to India with her daughter, who was teaching for VSO. There she discovered that the children of the Lepcha tribe were seriously disadvantaged: "Some of their teachers are trained, but not all of them," she told the Reporter. "Their English is not very good,



but the children have to sit their exams in English because there is no provision for them to do so in their own language". She has spent many months over the past few years helping the teachers and children with their English.

Her charity, established in 2007, has raised enough funds to pay the salaries of seven teachers in St. Mary's Tribal School in Nok Dara and another six in St. Joseph's High School in Git Dubling. She is hoping that her book sales and other fund raising events will pay for another two teachers.

Fragments -My Life and Death in a Cult, by Elizabeth Fraser

She constantly sought help through Taoism and Buddhism, and finally found it in the teachings of Krishnamurti. AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

THE Coffee Morning and Book Sale held in March, with help from the Woodcraft Folk, enabled the Group to donate £500 to Amnesty International UK for human rights promotion worldwide.

In the run-up to the European Elections on 4th June, the Group played a part in Amnesty's campaign to seek information from candidates on their approaches to the on-going process of building human rights concerns into every aspect of European legislation.

DR PETER SAVAGE - AN APPRECIATION

PETER SAVAGE, who sadly died in April, was the founder in 1979 of the Abercorn Amenity Association which, in 1981, became Portobello Amenity Society.

Peter, an architect, had the vision to realise that Portobello's wealth of fine architecture needed protection. In 1979, Portobello, as now, was undergoing great change. The Power Station was being demolished, and Pipe Street and Figgate Street, areas full of historical interest and fine Georgian architecture, were also being destroyed. Peter therefore formed an amenity association for residents living near Abercorn Park, as he did, who wished to protect Portobello's built heritage.

1981 saw the Open Air Swimming Pool decaying and disused. Britain was in a deep economic slump and there was no public money available to renovate it. This, and the imminent construction of the Portobello Bypass, led Peter to propose that the Abercorn Amenity Association should widen its scope to become the Portobello Amenity Society, concerning itself with the whole of the Portobello

The first major campaign that PAS undertook that year was to prevent the demolition of Windsor Place Church, then owned by Telcom and surplus to their requirements.

Since then PAS continues to monitor all planning applications for the Portobello area, as well as campaigning on a wide range of issues affecting the whole of Portobello.

None of this would have been possible without Peter's vision and his determination to protect Portobello's built heritage. PAS and Portobello owe him a great deal.


