PLAQUE HONOURS "RAILWAY MAN"



ERIC LOMAX, the prisoner of war whose story was told in the film *The Railway Man*, has been honoured with a commemorative plaque at the house in Bedford Terrace where he was born and lived until he joined up in 1939, at the start of WW2. He was captured by the Japanese while serving as a signals officer with the Royal Artillery, put to work on the building of the Burma Railway and severely tortured.

The plaque to Mr Lomax, who died aged 93 in 2012, was unveiled at a ceremony on 14th June by Charmaine, his daughter from his first marriage, and local man Nick Stroud who organised the project with the aid of generous sponsorship from ScotRail. The plaque reads: Eric Sutherland Lomax, 1919-2012, "The Railway Man", Lived here 1919-1939.

Charmaine said: "It's a great honour to be here to see my father commemorated in this way, and it was a precious moment for me to see the house where he grew up and the view that he saw from his bedroom window".

Nick Stroud says: "After decades of suffering as a result of the torture, Eric Lomax found it within himself to forgive and befriend Takashi Nagase, the Japanese interpreter who had come to symbolise his torment because, he said: "Sometime the hating has to stop". I thought this remarkable man should be commemorated at the place where he was born and grew up".

The film, starring Colin Firth and Nicole Kidman, was based on Eric Lomax's autobiography *The Railway Man*, published in 1995.

VILLAGE SHOW - HONOUR IN CAKE

THE bunting is out, the knitters are frantic and the brewers are brewing ready for the Portobello Village Show, which takes place on Sunday 7th September from 2-5pm in Rosefield Park.

This year there will be some new competitions, including the Charles William Schulze Commemorative Chocolate Cake Award. In 1906, when Charles built his factory to make luxury chocolate products in the Belgian style, it was a first for Scotland. As part of the WW1 commemorations

POD has devised this competition in honour of the owner of Portobello's historic chocolate factory and his two sons who were killed during the war.

Many local people have been surprised to learn the history of the building on Portobello Road that later became the WM Ramsay Technical Institute and has now been converted to flats.

Now it's down to you to get your teeth into creating a chocolate delight in the hope of winning a medal and a luxury chocolate hamper. There will also be old favourites like home brew, handicrafts and jam, and the children's competitions have had a revamp, with the library holding some workshop sessions to help them get off to a grand start.

The Newtongrange Brass Band will entertain us along with the Spurtle Ceilidh Band and a host of other surprise contributors. Stalls, food, duck races, dog parades and lots of activities will also help keep everyone happy.

WORK TO START ON NEW SCHOOL

THE City of Edinburgh Council (Portobello Park) Act 2014 came into force on Monday 4th August, following Royal Assent on Friday 1st. The Act will allow work to begin on building the new Portobello High School on Portobello Park.

Welcoming the news, Councillor Paul Godzik, Convener of Education, Children and Families at the Council said: "Now that Royal Assent has been received, it will be full steam ahead with our plans to replace Portobello High School. Over the last few weeks, since the Parliament approved the legislation, officers have been preparing to appropriate the park and sign the building contract with Balfour Beatty, and both will now take place over the next few days. In a few weeks work will start on Portobello Park as Balfour Beatty start to prepare the site for the construction works. I look forward to the opening of the new school in August 2016."

PORTOBELLO BOOK FESTIVAL

THE programme for the sixth Portobello Book Festival on the weekend of 3rd-5th October features a raft of lively sessions, including books on Edinburgh, castle culture, mental health, uses of science, writing and publishing, walking, and the politics of post-referendum Scotland. There are also workshops on writing, reminiscence and knitting.

This year we welcome to Portobello Scottish novelists Isla Dewar, Meaghan Delahunt and Jenni Fagan, among others, including new up-and-coming writers.

Meanwhile, there's a special place for you at the festival. The opening event on Friday 3rd October at Portobello Library will focus on 'A Sense of Place' - physical, spiritual, fictional, scientific, political are just some of

the ways of thinking about place covered in this year's festival. PORTY PROFILE No.

FORMER athletics internationalist Liz Sutherland settled in Portobello with her husband, sports journalist Sandy, in 1972. They chose the town because they thought it would be "a lovely place to live," and because Liz was spending much of her time training at Meadowbank.

Born and brought up in Fife, Liz was the eldest of three girls. She attended Ladybank Primary and Bell Baxter High where she discovered her passion for sport, particularly the long jump. Her father, a



keen rugby player, and her mother, a tennis enthusiast, encouraged her sporting abilities and she went on to study PE at Dunfermline College.

After graduation, National Athletics Coach Tom McNab suggested she move south so that he could coach her, which she did, combining training with a teaching post at Hatfield. After a year teaching PE and English she returned to Scotland to get married and continued to teach while pursuing her athletics career.

Training with Edinburgh Southern, Liz was given the opportunity to try 100m hurdles. She says she caused quite a stir on the day in 1967 when her first race resulted in a new Scottish record, one of the highlights of her career. She went on to represent Scotland at the 1970 Commonwealth Games in the 100 metres, reaching the final, but had to withdraw from the Games in Christchurch, NZ in 1974, as she was pregnant.

"I never got to the Olympics as I was injured in '72 and '76. I had been to South Africa training in '76, came back and was injured doing sprint hurdles. That was disappointing", she says.

In 1977, however, she changed to 400m hurdles and was named 1977 Scottish Sportswoman of the Year after setting a Commonwealth and Scottish record at Meadowbank, the latter standing for almost 20 years. "It was nice to be recognised for having worked damn hard," she says. "It was hard, as you were just an amateur. I would be running at Meadowbank at an International in the afternoon, having been out doing the shopping with my daughter Joanna in the pram in the morning." In 1978 she went to the European Championships in Prague where she sustained a serious injury, and decided to call it a day.

Liz began a new career when she returned to study at the University of Edinburgh. She graduated with an MA Hons in Scottish Literature and French and then began work at the University as a research assistant on The Collected Letters of Thomas and Jane Welsh Carlyle before becoming one of the project's editors, a job that she says suits her eye for detail.

Recently Liz was off accompanying Joanna, who was working at the World Basketball Championships in Spain and Turkey, this time to look after her seven-month-old grandchild Flora. "There's never a dull moment", she says.

ON THE BEAT

DURING May, Police Scotland in Edinburgh were engaged in Operation Wolf, aimed at tackling specific crimes affecting the city's communities. A targeted day of action took place involving plain-clothed and uniformed officers in East Edinburgh, with attention given particularly to drugs and anti-social behaviour. Officers also carried out high-visibility patrols during the evenings to crack down on anti-social behaviour, and to offer reassurance to the public.

The summer months have seen significant demands on Police Scotland, with major events taking place across the country, namely the Commonwealth Games, Ryder Cup, Edinburgh Festival, International Military Tattoo, and many local events such as the Craigmillar 50th Festival.

On 14th June the Commonwealth Games Queen's Baton Relay visited Portobello, providing an additional spectacle to the Rowporty Regatta scheduled for the same day. With many events and prolonged periods of hot weather, Portobello has had thousands of additional visitors, and the Community Policing Team have been busy on foot and bicycle to prevent and deter disorder and ensure we keep people safe.

We will continue to work with our partners to address your community concerns, to tackle anti-social behaviour, house-breaking and property crime, drug dealing and crimes of violence.

Many of them are elderly and infirm, and facing difficulties crossing the lane get to Milton Road to catch a bus. The lane is used as a rat-run and they fear things will get worse when the new school is built on Portobello Park.

PIANO MAN Ben Treuhaft, who lived in a tent on Portobello beach nearly five months, was forced to pack up his tent, piano and other belongings on 6th August after losing his appeal against eviction by the City of Edinburgh Council. Council officials said the tent breached the city's management rules which prohibit camping within one mile of a public road.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

THE June meeting of Portobello Community Council included the AGM, with the election of office bearers. Geoff Lynn, Lee Kindness and Mark Cameron continue as Chair, Vice-Chair and Treasurer respectively and Clare Slifer was elected as the new Secretary.

The key function of a community council is to ascertain and express the views of the community to the local authority and other public bodies. Over the past year we have set up, or improved, ways to enable us to do that effectively. Our website has been refreshed and tied into updates on Facebook and Twitter. We have also set up a new email list, which is a helpful digest of local items of interest. For those not online, we're in the process of refreshing our area in the library and have a network of four notice boards locally to share information.

Our consultation on 'dog zones' on the beach generated a lot of interest and was completed by over 600 people. The results showed support for the status-quo, rather than the proposed dog-free areas. We have shared the report and the many insightful comments received with Edinburgh Council and hope to do further work on a positive campaign encouraging good behaviour from all users of the beach and prom.

Future or current consultations include proposed 20mph speed limits across Edinburgh and the Cruden Homes/Aldi planning application for the Baileyfield site.

Carry On Camping?

SUMMER holidays seem like a distant memory so why, I wonder, am I still tripping over camping gear? Maybe we are reluctant to put it away, as doing so marks the end of the summer and perhaps of family camping holidays, as our older children may have their own plans next year.

This summer we went camping in Cornwall for the first time. We packed up the car, the trailer, and every available space with all our kit and headed off. With three not so small children in the back of the car or, as often happens, one of them in the front and me in the back separating warring factions, we broke the journey with overnight stops at hotels to make it more tolerable.

After such a long trip, we were so relieved to reach the camp site nestled on a stunning beach, we failed to notice that our pitch was probably in the worst possible position. It was in front of a pylon that emitted a constant buzzing noise, beside the site's main road, near the toilet block and on an ants' nest. After three sleepless nights and days of battling ants, we asked to move. We were given a lovely secluded spot, but it took the whole day to re-pitch.

Now I am beginning to think that what I really remember about the holiday was the overnight stays in the hotels. My youngest son confirmed this when he said: "Mum, when can we go back and stay at the service station. I could live there you know." Maybe it is time to put all that kit away!

MANY people still think PEDAL is a cycling organisation, but the acronym comes from Portobello Energy Descent and Land reform group. Our local initiative came at the same time



as the transition town concept, formulated in Totnes by Rob Hopkins.

The Transition movement is not just another energy-saving initiative distributed downwards by government or power companies to show how green they are. It is a response to the question of how we might cope with modern living while reducing our dependency on fossil fuels which, despite new methods of extraction, are not a sustainable source of energy and other products.

The drive comes from local people coming up with initiatives, no matter how small, that help reduce this reliance on dwindling reserves. This is why PEDAL started the market in Brighton Park, to help promote quality local producers and attract shoppers to Portobello. In the workshops we have held over the years about what people want in Portobello, a vibrant diverse high street with useful shops has always been a priority. A functioning high street and the beach are the things most remarked on by visitors and new residents.

Recently a small group of our members went to West Kilbride to see what they had done to promote their high street. The situation was dire, with 29 closed or boarded-up shops, the result of shoppers travelling out of the town to retail centres. The decline seen all over Britain has come about because of shoppers switching just a small amount of money from local traders, making some businesses unviable. As more shops closed there was less reason to use the high street, which led to more closures.

What they did in West Kilbride by creating a 'Craft Town', sometimes buying shops to let at reasonable rents, is possibly not right for Portobello. But it did show what can be done at a local level by local people. It also highlighted the consequences of not using local facilities, with the adage "use them or lose them" ringing in the mind.

ST MARK'S CHURCH WALL

RESTORATION work is taking place on the boundary wall around the graveyard at St. Mark's Church. The pavement on St Mark's Place has been closed and the leaning walls shored up. The work is funded by a Heritage Lottery Fund grant and donations from the Dunderdale (Scottish Episcopal Church) Trust, The Pilgrim Trust, and All Churches Trust. Small excavations by trained archaeologists will take place, as required, for the construction of new foundations, but it is not anticipated that any burials will be disturbed. A survey of all memorials will be undertaken and information leaflets and interpretation boards will be produced. The work is expected to take a year.



THE cool days of autumn are the best time for planting, when the soil still retains some heat, so this is the time when I split plants that have started to go bare in the middle of the clump, replanting some and giving some away to friends. Herbaceous perennials like asters, phlox and Shasta daisies can be split in situ; just dig out a few pieces roughly a spade's width, on opposite sides of the clump and replant, or dig out the whole clump, discard the woody centre and divide by chopping through with a spade. I transplant them to a different part of the garden or make the clump bigger by covering a larger area, then water well before mulching around with wet newspaper and covering with a sprinkling of earth, our own compost, or grass clippings

Another way to give away plants is by collecting seed. Verbena bonariensis, that lovely tall, wispy purple flower beloved of bees, is easily grown from seed and comes true (i.e. it doesn't cross-pollinate and produce other variations). Collect seeds on a dry day in paper envelopes (those sent with junk mail are ideal) or bags, label and date.

Finally, I give away 'sticks' - shrub hardwood cuttings, bundles of elderflower (especially the dark one which makes lovely pink champagne) or philadephus for its gorgeous scent. Finger-thick 60 cm lengths, wrapped in wet newspaper can last about 24 hours if they have to be transported far, without losing too much moisture. They can then be pushed about 15cm into cleared ground and left for about a year before moving. I do this around the kitchen garden where they take up no room.

If grown in light soil potatoes can be left in the ground, but in heavy soil they are better lifted and stored, ensuring no light can get to them. I layer them between sheets of newspapers in wooden boxes, kindly given to me by my Asian grocer friends. These boxes are great for storing all sorts of things, including keeping all those plastic pots in order, as they stack neatly and are light to lift. I dream of having garden essentials and useful bits and pieces all in order; it never happens, but I do try! Leave leeks, beetroot, carrots, parsnips in the ground until needed.

Autumn means harvesting of seeds and crops, and storing and preserving whether by juicing, freezing or making wine/cider. It also means planting bulbs, especially hyacinths for Christmas presents to fill rooms with that lovely scent in January.

ELEBRATING WILLIAM HA

ON Sunday 1st May a plaque to William Hay, architect, was unveiled at 18 Brunstane Road North, better known to many as Rabbit Hall. The plaque was funded by a Scotmid Community Grant and unveiled by Graham Philip, then manager of Scotmid, Portobello. Hay was probably better known for his buildings outside Scotland, with his most significant work here a major restoration of St. Giles' Cathedral.

Hay was born in Peterhead in 1818 and became an apprentice joiner, but after breaking his leg studied architecture. He married in 1844 and moved to St. John's, Newfoundland, in 1847; the British Government had asked him to design government buildings there and in Halifax, Nova Scotia. They lived here for several years, although there seems to have been a brief return visit to Peterhead in the early 1850s, when he designed St John's Episcopal Church. They then settled in Toronto. Many of the buildings he designed there have been demolished, but St Basil's Church, in downtown



Toronto, remains. The City Hall and Court House in Kingston, Ontario, also remain as fine examples of his classical gothic designs.

Hay returned to Edinburgh shortly after the death of his wife in 1860. He set up a practice in Edinburgh and built Rabbit Hall in what was then Hamilton Street. He re-married in 1870 and had one daughter. He was employed by William Chambers, then Lord Provost, to create a single space from the subdivided spaces in St. Giles' Cathedral. Galleries and partition walls were removed and the building was



cleaned. Mr. Chambers commented: "From 1872 onward the restoration work had been done by the advice and under the personal superintendence of Mr. William Hay, Architect, Edinburgh, whose knowledge of ancient ecclesiastical architecture is only equalled by the refined taste and artistic skill which he brought to bear upon the work. By the Spring of 1883 the process of renovation was all but completed and with a success even more striking than had been anticipated."

Interestingly, although notes on Chambers can be found in St Giles', there



is no written information about Hay available there. A bronze plaque to Hay can be found, but is almost inaccessible at the unused north entrance. Miranda Gatliffe, of Rabbit Hall, had a plaster cast of this fine plaque made which now hangs in her vestibule. This was also unveiled and can be seen above.

Hay designed the Cathedral of the Most Holy Trinity in Hamilton, Bermuda, but due to failing health, the main work was overseen by his partner George Henderson. Hay died in 1888 after eight months' illness. He left a flourishing partnership and has been described as being of 'kindly and genial disposition'.

AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

THE Group's annual street and pub collection on 30th/31st May raised £249.95, and £250.00 was sent to Amnesty for its work worldwide.

Letter-writing is at the heart of our work and from March to June over 30 appeals were sent to authorities in countries where there is repression and, in many cases, serious human rights violations with victims becoming prisoners of conscience or under threat. Letter-writing will resume on Wednesday 10th September in The Dalriada on the Prom at 7.30pm. Anyone who wants to help will be welcomed.

Amnesty's major campaign for 2014, Stop Torture, is well under way; after five cases were featured at our Market stall on 6th June, 119 appeal cards were sent off.

There will be another chance, for those who missed it in Portobello, to see the film An echo of pain of the many about the civil war in Guatemala and its victims, on Friday 10th October at the Augustine Church, George IV Bridge.

In the context of the World Cup in Brazil, Amnesty has highlighted the plight of those who were brutally attacked and at least two killed by police, at peaceful protests. Many were living in appalling poverty while vast sums were spent on sport, and many evicted to accommodate it. Our group has joined others in making representations for justice for victims to the authorities in Brazil.
