# 'PITZ' SITE DEVELOPMENT

EVALUATION by city council officers of the bids received from developers for the purchase of the Power League ('Pitz') site took place on 7th December 2017. It had been intended to report to the Finance and Resources Committee on 23rd January, but at the request of local councillors and community members, the report was deferred to its meeting on 27th March.

The Scottish Government awarded Action Porty £12,000 to carry out a 'Making Places' exercise for the site and a Community-Led Design Weekend took place at the Town Hall on 3rd and 4th March. Input was invited from local residents, businesses and others with an interest in how the Pitz/Tumbles site might realistically be developed for maximum community benefit.

Through a series of open discussions, design sessions and presentations, and led by a team of experienced local architects and designers, the Design Weekend focused on creating three possible designs for the Westbank Street site, contributing to a Design Brief that will be



submitted to the City of Edinburgh Council ahead of the Finance and Resources Committee's March meeting. At this meeting, councillors will decide whether to sell the site to Cala Homes, identified as their 'preferred bidder' in January, or to take on board Action Porty's design brief, with a view to developing the site in a way that is more aligned with the community's needs and aspirations.

The results of the Design

Weekend will also be compiled into a report for the Scottish Government, whose 'Making Places' initiative seeks to encourage communities to positively and actively contribute to the development of their local area, and tackle inequality and disadvantage to achieve development that benefits everyone, not just private interests. It remains to be seen whether the council will take heed of the community's

wishes, or will go ahead with selling the land to Cala Homes.

Action Porty is now encouraging the wider community to contact their local councillors to make their feelings known ahead of the council's final decision on the matter, due on 27th March.

## REPRIEVE FOR **GEORGE CINEMA**

**THE** councillors on the city council's development management sub-committee unanimously rejected the most recent planning application for the Art Deco C-listed former George cinema, then Bingo Hall, on Bath Street on 21st February. The application would have involved retaining the facade but demolishing the rest and replacing it with 20 flats. (A previous application in July 2017 would have demolished the whole building and replaced it with 21 flats.) Council officials had recommended approval, on the grounds that the building, which contains asbestos, was incapable of being restored. The building's reprieve has been welcomed by all four Portobello and Craigmillar councillors and by the Friends of the George. The Out of the Blue Arts and Education Trust has now expressed an interest in developing the building as a community cinema and cultural venue. The developer, Liam Buckley, is believed to be considering an appeal to the Scottish Government.



Excavations at Baileyfield Crescent have revealed the foundations of the former Baileyfield Glass Works which closed in 1968. The site has been exposed by the AOC Archaeology Group in partnership with Barrat Homes and the City Council prior to the next phase of house building on this site.

## **ACTION PORTY EXPANDS BOUNDARY**

**AT** a well-attended meeting held on 18th January, it was agreed that the original Friends of Bellfield group, set up to initiate the campaign to save Bellfield, be formally wound up with the remaining monies being transferred to Action Porty, the successor organisation.

A second resolution, also passed overwhelmingly, was to extend the boundaries of Action Porty. It was explained that the company was established with a restricted boundary to assist the community right to buy process, but with Bellfield now safely in community ownership, Action Porty was taking the opportunity to expand their boundary as follows: southwards from Kings Road, up Baileyfield Road and Duddingston Park to the junction with Milton Road, and eastwards along Milton Road to the Eastfield junction. This opens up membership to more local people and means that some associate members may now be eligible to become ordinary members.

Meanwhile, under the direction of Development Manager Emma Griffiths, headway is being made on essential repairs to Bellfield to make the building safe for public use once again. 

#### **PORTY PROFILE No. 68**

EDWARD Ross is best known for his book *Filmish*, a graphic novel published in 2015. It's a rollercoaster journey through the history of film, with Edward taking centre stage as narrator and a character, appearing throughout the book. It has been published in six languages, and has taken him across the world to speak at book festivals.

"It all happened by accident," Edward tells me over coffee at the Skylark. He moved to Portobello



On graduating, Edward tried to write short film scripts while working at the Filmhouse cinema, but he kept coming back to comic books.

"I found it more exciting to get up in the morning and write a comic, so that's what I did", says Edward. He photocopied some of his early versions of what was to become Filmish, and asked the Filmhouse to sell them. The first 100 sold out quickly, and he realised he might be on to something.

He and his partner Mary, also from Portobello, moved back to the area, and although he misses the bustle of the city, he confesses that: "Mentally it's a great place to be. It has a slower pace, and if I need inspiration, I can go for a walk on the beach."

The couple now have two young children, and with both sets of grandparents living in Portobello too, it's a perfect place for them to grow up.

His next book focuses on the history of gaming – Gamish - and although it will mainly cover video games, Edward insists that "we have always had this desire to play." Many video games are now aimed at adults, and can take hundreds of hours to complete. "We're at a real turning point in the history of video games," he goes on, "and games like That Dragon, Cancer and Depression Quest offer affecting, emotional experiences a million miles from Super Mario or Grand Theft Auto."

# ON THE BEAT

**THE** Community Policing Team undertook a local initiative over the festive period targeting domestic abuse, acquisitive crime, drugs supply and road traffic offences. Amongst a number of arrests on warrant, static speed traps were set to target drivers exceeding the new 20mph speed limit.

A highlight was the recovery of a large cannabis cultivation, potentially worth £52,000, from an address on Portobello High Street. This would not have been possible without information received from the local community and we continue to encourage residents to report any similar concerns to help us disrupt organised crime.

Since the turn of the year we have noticed an increase in the number of graffiti tags, particularly 'MR SENO', appearing. We will investigate any report of vandalism thoroughly with the assistance of our Environmental Warden partners, and welcome any information anyone has on who may be responsible.

WHY A COMMUNITY COUNCIL?

THE official explanation is that a community council's "primary purpose is to ascertain and express the views of the community to the local authority and other public bodies." Ascertaining the views of the community on an issue that matters to Portobello is something which Portobello Community Council is renowned for doing, and doing well. These include online surveys, hustings, and Town Hall meetings, as well as discussion at the monthly community council meetings which are open to the public and happen on the last Monday of every month (except July and December) at 7.30pm in the hall behind the Baptist Church.

But is there a way our community council can speak up for us more strongly?

We are lucky that our four local city councillors regularly attend our meetings and hear our concerns, but when the views of the community are clear and may be challenging for those councillors to champion, is it the job of the community council to champion them instead, or to create space for others in the community to do so?

Perhaps the Westbank/Pitz situation provides a good example of how we try to respond. Here we initially put in a participation request so we could give our views on the developers' designs. Meanwhile, our concern both about what was on offer and about Edinburgh Council's consultation, led us to organise our own much more openended consultation, and we followed up by organising a Town Hall meeting, where the push by Action Porty for an alternative vision for the site really took off.

Perhaps key is for the community council to be encouraging of all those initiatives that seek to improve Portobello, even - or especially - when those initiatives are challenging to those who hold more power.

#### IT'S A DOG'S LIFE!

TWO four-legged friends have joined our family and have been keeping us all very busy over the last few months. After years of procrastinating about getting a dog, and a year of looking for suitable dogs to rehome, we struck lucky and ended up with two real characters, not unlike their Still Game namesakes Jack and Bobby. Resembling cuddly teddy bears, they possess the super-power of luring teenagers to leave their rooms and go outside for walks.

Like most dogs they love to scavenge, and on one particular walk in the woods at Meadowfield Park, we came across the aftermath of a party. Jack and Bobby were in a sniffing frenzy and we had a lot of trouble stopping them from licking the beer bottles and crisp packets. We decided to do a mini clean-up before they became too inebriated. We gathered all the rubbish into a plastic bag and I dutifully headed off to look for the nearest bin on Arthur's Seat. The bag, full of rattling empties, made an almighty clang as I dropped it into the bin and I looked round to find that I had attracted the attention of a passing couple who shot me a funny look. "Disgusting what rubbish people will leave behind them", I muttered, but I could see they weren't convinced. I caught up with the others feeling strangely guilty, and when I told the children what had happened they cackled like Isa. "Oh Mum, we can't take you anywhere", they

connections arise that bring home a point. The increased reporting of plastic polluting the oceans comes at the same time as the sad news



of Earthy closing with the loss of another independent trader. Earthy produce was loose, with paper bags provided if required. The vast majority of fresh produce in the supermarkets comes in plastic packaging which can find its way into water courses and then to the sea. It is estimated that there are five trillion pieces of plastic in the oceans, including in the guts of sea life. We can do something about it, no matter how small, by buying loose fruit and vegetables whenever possible, rather than the pre-packaged items that are often more expensive.

Reduce, re-use, recycle is still a useful slogan and whilst recycling is good, re-using is even better. What about a system where milk is delivered in bottles with the empty ones being collected for re-use? This service exists at the moment in Portobello but how many of us make use of it?

One thing arising from the loss of Earthy is renewed interest in a community shop. A well-attended meeting at the beginning of February has resulted in a steering group being formed to emulate similar ventures in other communities. This idea is something that I have written about before to complement the monthly Portobello Market and maybe there will now be sufficient enthusiasm to take it forward. # GROWING ORGANIC with Susan Burns

AFTER the winter some plants may have died, and it is difficult to know whether they are going to revive. Wait until growth starts and, if in doubt, scratch a small area at the base of the plant to see if there is green; any shade of brown means it is dead. This is a great time to divide grasses or herbaceous perennials. Bulbs will be looking great, but any that have been in a long time and have no flowers (called blindness, in daffodils) need digging up, splitting and replanting. A blind clump split last year resulted in nearly 50 bulbs, now planted along path edges.

Orders of plantlets or plug plants will arrive just as the growing season starts. As a night frost in early May could kill them, harden them off before planting out, with one week in a cool room, one in a cold frame or protected area such as against a house wall, and an extra one if frost is forecast, covered with fleece. Clothes pegs are good for keeping coverings in place if wind follows frost. Individual plants, like tree ferns, can be wrapped in fleece. By the end of May we are usually frost-free, so pumpkins, squashes or sweetcorn can be planted out.


I grow lots of plants from seed in the greenhouse. They don't take up much room, but the next stage of pricking-out and hardening-off needs a lot of flat space. I use anything that can provide frost protection, such as some bricks with glass on top. As plants grow taller you can increase the height of this cold frame with more bricks, and it has the advantage that it can be dismantled and stored somewhere else.

If you have well-drained sandy soil you can plant chitted (seed) potatoes or dahlias in March, but if you're on clay wait until April. Raised beds on my clay mean I get a month extra growing at both ends of the season. Last year my pumpkins did well almost into November.

# **MATTERS**

AS the NHS celebrates its 70th birthday this year, it's time to consider the issues raised by the increasing demands made on it. Its inception was "... the climax of a hugely ambitious plan to bring good health care to all", and Aneria Thomas, the first baby to be born within the NHS, says that health care was previously something only "the privileged few could enjoy". There was concern at the time that people would treat the service as a right, about the cost, and the Victorian buildings the new service inherited.

The '3 before GP' campaign would like us to ask ourselves three questions before visiting a GP surgery. Can we self-care? Can we find an answer to our problem on NHS Inform or other reputable website? Can we get advice and treatment from a pharmacist? This would protect the GPs' time for when we all have more complex health issues needing investigation.

Our pub quiz in February raised over £200. It was well attended and helped to put Amnesty and its human rights work on the map. Many thanks to all who gave their time and talents.






