TRIBE PORTY EXPANDS

TRIBE PORTY hosted a street party on Saturday 12th May to celebrate securing the lease on the former Earthy premises in Windsor Place. There was a range of stalls at the well attended event with street food, drinks, pre-loved clothing, arts and crafts, bicycle and violin doctors, seeds and plants and a range of herbal remedies and therapy tasters.

Plans have been drawn up and will be submitted for approval to provide more co-working spaces and an open reception come community area. The spaces will be occupied by freelancers, Tribe Women, see page five, and The Edinburgh Tool Library (ETL).

ETL hosted an open evening on 16th May to give locals the opportunity to view the new space and contribute

ideas about how it could most effectively be used. Current plans are to have a counter at the front where tools can be borrowed and returned, two workshop spaces at the back, one for powered machinery and a quieter space for handtool work, plus a wood store. Work is already under way to re-configure the space,

with a view to getting some services operating by later in the summer. ETL sees this as long-term facility, complementing existing premises in Leith.

Tribe Porty have financed their expansion through a combination of their own funds and a loan from Social Investment Scotland.

POTTERY KILN AT RISK OF COLLAPSE



THE two pottery kilns in Bridge Street belonged to Buchan's pottery that produced stoneware in Portobello from 1867 to 1972. They are significant structures as they are the last remaining pottery kilns in Scotland, and as such are protected as Scheduled Ancient Monuments.

A recent annual inspection of the 1906 kiln showed that there is a risk of it collapsing, so wooden hoarding has been put up while part-demolition and rebuilding work is planned under the direction of Historic Environment Scotland. The top part of the 1909 kiln had to be rebuilt a few years ago after it too collapsed.

BRIGHTON PLACE RE-SURFACING

THE Transport and Environment Committee of the City of Edinburgh Council agreed on 9th March to reconstruct the surface of Brighton Place using traditional setts. This reverses a previous decision, of January 2016, to replace the setts with asphalt.

The work is estimated to take 60 weeks and will be in four phases. It is expected to start at the end of July/ beginning of August.

Local businesses and residents will be consulted on the works and kept informed of the phasing, timescales and traffic management arrangements.

To facilitate cycling, it is proposed to lay a 1.5m strip, from the kerb, of flat-top setts along the full length of the northbound carriageway, and from Rosefield Place to the railway bridge on the southbound carriageway. A new traffic island at Christian Path will provide a right-turn lane for cyclists heading north.

ROSY NAYLOR

ROSY NAYLOR is founder and curator of Art Walk Portobello. It was inevitable that she would end up living by the seaside, here in Portobello. She grew up near the seaside resort of Whitstable in Kent, then continued along the south coast to study visual and performing arts at Brighton. She then attended Glasgow School of Art, to do a masters in fine art, specialising in site-specific art. An exchange programme took her to



Lisbon in Portugal, where she became fascinated by a project there that focused on bringing art to the masses via public spaces and shops in the city. The seeds of Art Walk Portobello had been sown – and on returning to the UK Rosy worked as an event manager and website designer, but all the time was thinking about this wider interest in developing an art project within a community.

Rosy moved to Portobello in 2010, and it was only in 2015 that the first Art Walk Portobello took place. Spanning three days, and a route which took in the promenade along with local artists' studios and local shops, the walk invited the public to take a glimpse into the thriving art scene in Portobello, and explore the past too, through specially commissioned pieces in public spaces. Every year the walk takes on a different theme, and this year it is 'Pleasure Ground' and takes place across two weekends, from 30th August to 9th September.

"I'm excited this year," says Rosy. "The theme includes a 'Bandstand Project' and we have commissioned a musical composition to be performed by Portobello Community Choir that will link the Ross Theatre bandstand in Princes Street Gardens with the old bandstand on Portobello prom.

"I have always had an interest in music, playing the clarinet at school, and then the soprano saxophone. My hope is that in this Art Walk we will be able to have a musical parade, bringing another dimension to the event. We plan to show films on the beach too, showing archive footage of Portobello, when the funfair and the Marine Gardens were popular attractions, bringing thousands of people to the resort."

When not curating Art Walk Portobello, Rosy loves growing things like beetroot, corn and celery on her allotment.

PORTOBELLO COMMUNITY COUNCIL

THE Community Council receives an administrative grant from City of Edinburgh Council of about £680 for meeting room hire, consultations and so on. This doesn't meet our running costs, or other costs, such as hiring the Town Hall for election hustings.

The PCC's core role is to represent the views of the community, for example in relation to planning issues. We're very much reactive to what is thrown at us, enabling community consultations on the Pitz/Westbank site and The George, for example. At the Edinburgh Council Planning Committee deliberations on The George, when the developer seemed to intimate PCC support for the partial demolition, the PCC rep responded: "The problem with this statement is that it is completely, entirely, absolutely untrue".

With next to no resources, we can speak when there is clear community consensus. Just think what the PCC could do if it had real resources.

"WHO CARES WHAT PICTURE YOU SEE..."

YOU know when your days of hands-on parenting are truly over when you are no longer required to watch soprano chipmunks or highly-strung animals in the Antarctic on exciting, but bankrupting trips to the cinema.

Instead, my daughter, who much to her delight is no longer hindered by rating rules, offers to take me to see Get Out which she assures me is a light psychological thriller. I come out of the cinema slightly traumatised by the blood and gore, despite watching with my eyes nearly shut. She, on the other hand, doesn't bat an eyelid, but says that I am looking quite pale and propels me to the nearest pub to buy me a stiff drink.

As a special treat, my sons have even been known to take me to see a Marvel comic film, as long as I throw in a meal deal, of course. I enjoy the films, although I admit to nodding off once or twice, and I missed chunks of the action during Guardians of the Galaxy. The main thing is, it is a great way to spend precious time in their company, just like the old days.

Come to think of it. I can't remember the last time I went to the cinema with my mother, but it's been too long. Perhaps we'll go and see something clean to avoid parental tutting, eat a bucket of popcorn and, no doubt about it, we'll both fall asleep!

AS I write this article we are preparing for the next Portobello Market held in Brighton Park on the first Saturday of every month. This market has been operating



for eight years and whilst some stalls offer speciality items, there are also some basic foods such as cheese, mutton and game at very reasonable prices. These complement what you can find on Portobello High Street in the butcher, fishmonger, delicatessen, wine shop and others.

However, the lack of a greengrocer is a serious concern and, since the demise of Earthy, it has been necessary to buy fruit and vegetables in the supermarkets or travel to Musselburgh or Leith Walk. I wrote in the last issue about the problems of having to buy a pack of vegetables from a supermarket with the superfluous plastic packaging, when all you want is one item. A delivered vegetable box may be a solution for some and there are a couple of companies that offer these in the Portobello area.

But to have a greengrocer offering quality, fresh produce and open at a time that suits you would fill this gap, and PEDAL has promoted this in the past. A sustainable community isn't just about air-miles or carbon reduction, it's also about people meeting often, and shopping on the high street is one of the ways this happens.

A group has now formed to take a Community Shop forward, based around greengrocery, but possibly more ideas are still being developed. Besides local experience, there is help from one of the founders of Dig-in at Bruntsfield. Some of you may have been asked to take part in a survey to establish interest and support. PLANETARY HEALING IN PORTOBELLO

THIS year the Planetary Healing Centre at 288 Portobello High Street will celebrate its 15th anniversary. The charity, co-founded by the couple Claudia Goncalves and Mark Halliday, has been running a well-being project offering holistic therapies to low/no waged, disadvantaged groups who are struggling with their health, as well as

other services catering for different groups. Today, the Centre has two part-time employees and is staffed by 42 volunteers.

In May 2016, The Edinburgh Holistic Shop was launched, a social enterprise venture to make the charity more self-sustainable. Mark explains: "Since the shop opened we have had lots of with Susan Burns



EVEN if we get a wet summer, watering is still important. If you have containers the foliage can act like an umbrella, so check if a pot needs watering by poking your finger in the soil - if it feels at all dry then it needs a drink. The best times to water are in the morning or evening. If you are going away, even just for a weekend, fill a plastic bottle and freeze it. Pierce a small hole in the cap then turn upside down and a small amount will trickle through. Good for hanging baskets, but take them down and leave somewhere shady until you return.

Concerns about plastic clogging our seas also mean we need to ensure that as little as possible gets broken up into tiny fragments and into the soil. Do not let plastic degrade in unseen corners of the garden, but take it to the recycling or put in the green bin. I have been amazed at both the fragility of some plastics that start to break up quickly into unusable bits, such as cheap trugs, and the durability of others, like better grade seed trays that I've had for over 20 years. I try to reduce my use of plastic, but for some things it is really useful because of its strength and light weight.

If you have strawberry plants that are not giving a good crop make a note to renew the plants and change their position. They only last about three years, but the runners they throw out can be used to grow new plants. If you only need a few, take a runner and pop it in a pot of compost while still attached to the plant. Alternatively, once runners are starting to root into the soil by themselves, cut them all off and replant in a new bed. Destroy the old plants, as they will harbour disease and will never give a good crop.

Last and most important of all is to sit and enjoy. Perhaps take a few nice pictures and get them printed off to admire through the dark winter days.

GONE UP IN SMOKE

THE advertising of cigarettes or any tobacco product is no longer allowed. It is recognised now that smoking is bad for your health, but it wasn't always so. In the early 20th century smoking was often seen as suave and sophisticated and promoted as good for you. There were various promotions to encourage smokers to buy a particular brand, including the use of cigarette cards.

Companies put cigarette cards in their packets as inducements and you could buy albums in which to save them. The cigarette card shown here is from the series Arms of British Towns. As you can see, the front shows the Portobello coat of arms with the reverse showing the manufacturers Thomson & Porteous, who were an Edinburgh company. Apparently heraldic cards were quite unusual. Thomson & Porteous included cards



from about 1901 to 1916. This series began in 1905 and had 50 cards.

Two brands of cigarettes are mentioned: Luntin Cigarettes and Alderwood Cigarettes. I had never heard of either of these, so decided to investigate further. I was also intrigued that Portobello was deemed important enough to merit a place in a British series.

Thomson & Porteous was founded as a

Portobello obtains its name from a house built here by an old seaman in 1742, who named the build-ing "Portobello Hut" in honour of the capture of a South American fown of that name by Admiral Vernon. Porto-bello is now part of the muni-cipality of Edinburgh. HOMSON&PORTEOUS EDINBURGH.

limited company in 1854 and closed in 1960. They were described as 'Tobacco, Snuff and Cigarette Manufacturers and Cigar Merchants'. Their factory was in 105 to 109 Leith Street. Control of the firm was acquired by Godfrey Phillips Ltd of London in 1926.

Luntin Mixture was described in a 1903 advert as 'the tobacco par excellence for Seaside or River' and

'Its rich and consistent flavour and remarkable coolness, make it an ideal holiday smoke under all conditions.' This clearly suggests that smoking it would make you feel better. You could buy a 2oz pack (about 50 grams) for one shilling (5p). I could find no adverts for the cigarettes themselves.

The Trades Boards (Tobacco) Order of 1919 established a Trade Board for the Tobacco Trade in Great Britain. The Minister of Labour appointed Mr G Thomson, Thomson & Porteous, Edinburgh, as a member representing employers, so they must have been a well-known company.

Perhaps the Edinburgh and seaside connections were the reasons Portobello was included in the series, although by 1905 it had amalgamated with Edinburgh and was no longer an independent entity.

Mortality rates are over 25 per cent higher for those who are socially isolated. Portobello is a community where we meet friends in the street, in the shops - and on the promenade, as we take our exercise. Two 'miracle cures in one medicine'.

AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

AT this year's Amnesty UK AGM, our representative was given a beautifully illustrated poster by the Amnesty representative from Eritrea, in recognition of our work over a number of years to raise awareness and campaign on behalf of people who have "disappeared" or suffered for peaceful criticism of the régime. The poster described this as "far beyond what could have been expected of a small amnesty group".

The group's stall at Portobello Market in April featured the case of Rodrigo Mundaco, a water rights activist in Chile, who has been physically attacked, subjected to death threats and taken to court for exposing illegal water extraction. A petition, asking for protection for him and others at risk, was well supported by the public.

At our April meeting the San Gannay singing group described their visits in 2012 and 2017 to Israel/Palestinian Occupied Territories and sang some of the songs performed on their travels. We were moved to hear of the situations they encountered and the responses of local people to the singing.

Our coffee morning and book sale in April raised £366 for human rights work in the UK and worldwide.
