The festival has attracted many talented local and national writers to Portobello Library, promising an exciting line-up. There's our usual fantastic variety of written and spoken word with themes including nature, cycling adventures, mental and physical health, the lure of the sea, biographies, food and culture, creating a queer books archive, politics, stories from Scotland and more. This year we are thrilled that two events will be conducted in Scots.

#### **ART WALK PORTY FESTIVAL 2024**

THE Art Walk Porty Festival takes place from 7th to 15th September, bringing together 65 artists across 46 venues arranged around four walks comprising Art Houses, Art in Shops and public realm spaces. This year's theme of 'UnderCurrent' focuses on marine health, coastal ecologies and food futures. The Festival Hub at Annan's, 268 Portobello High Street, features work from ongoing projects involving fungi, lichen and the mapping of local wild food.

A central part of the festival is *Thrift*, a series

of participatory art climate conversations on Porty Beach, near John Street. Take part in ecologically framed workshops, talks and events, or bring your own fruit, veg or herbs to try out the new Solar Dehydrator. Thrift is supported by an award from The Royal Society of Edinburgh and explores ways to improve access to healthy local food.

# LAST BANK TO GO

**LLOYDS** Banking Group (LBG) has announced it will close the Portobello branch of the Bank of Scotland (BOS) including its cash machine on 22nd October 2024.

The LBG Closing Branch Review says that customer and business transactions at the BOS branch have fallen by over 40 per cent since 2019. The report says customers use online and telephone banking rather than visit local branches, and suggests that following the closure, customers can bank at the Post Office or at BOS, Musselburgh.

Portobello once had six banks: Clydesdale, RBS personal, RBS business, TSB, British Linen and BOS. Local resident Rosie Nimmo, who has started a petition on www.change.org, said: "I can't imagine how Porty will cope with the loss of its last remaining bank given how many people shop at the local businesses and do their banking here. I believe the impact of the bank closing will be catastrophic for Porty."

## **NEW MP FOR PORTOBELLO**

PORTOBELLO, as part of the Edinburgh East and Musselburgh constituency, gained a new MP on 4th July in the shape of Labour's Chris Murray. He beat the previous MP, Tommy Sheppard of the SNP, into second place, followed by the Green, Conservative, Reform UK and Liberal Democrat candidates.

## VE SCHWAB

VE SCHWAB, the author of popular fantasy novels for adults, young adults and children, has chosen to make her home in Portobello. She was born in California, was brought up in Nashville, Tennessee and



attended college in St Louis. She has lived in New York City and just outside Liverpool, where home was a converted garden shed. When VE first visited Edinburgh and stepped off the train at Waverley Station onto Scottish soil, she felt a sense of connection, she says. She then came to study for a Masters degree and lived in the New Town. Deciding to stay, she chose Portobello, "a small town in a city", and loves that she knows so many people and that those in the local coffee shop know her order.

VE couldn't sit still as a child and played soccer for 10 years. She walks eight to 10 miles round Portobello with her dog every day and loves that she can walk into town for any appointments she has. She has always been a writer or storyteller and finds it addictive that you can write a story and hand it to others as a gift. VE believes that there is more fantasy writing than we think, "as it encompasses anything that extends beyond our known concept of reality". She asks: "what if" and believes that reading is a form of escapism that fosters the imagination at all ages. She thinks her job is to make you doubt your reality. Reading is how we learn and she likes to challenge readers, she says. The themes for her children's books are different, but she thinks that children are brave and discerning and have the control to put down a book if it discomfits them.

The George cinema is one of her deep passions. She thinks that cinemas appeal to all, providing a place for the community to gather for entertainment, and she is keen to resurrect the George as a place for this.

Although VE tours two or three times a year, she says: "Portobello is my home and I feel most creative there."



# COMMUNITY SUPPORT VITAL FOR ST MARK'S UPCOMING RENOVATION PROJECT

FOR nearly 200 years, St Mark's has been a landmark in the heart of Portobello. Now this unique historic church is moving into the next stage of its life. Repairs and improvements are about to start, thanks to £134,000 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund. This supplements existing grants from the National Churches Trust (£100,000), other smaller grants, and a large amount of fundraising by the congregation.

Costs have greatly increased since 2019, and we have not raised all £700,000 estimated to be needed for this phase. However, the congregation will be vacating the church in September so work can begin on the improvements that are possible with the grants so far received. We are very grateful to other local churches for providing us with a home during this time.

The building will be more environmentally friendly – with insulation, secondary glazing, draught proofing and efficient lighting. There will be a new floor, as well as a new toilet and kitchen.



The Royal National Institute for Deaf People (RNID) now hold a monthly drop-in at the library





**NOW** is the time to collect seeds, on a dry day, from annuals such as sweet peas, marigolds, cornflowers and dahlias, and from peas, beans and tomatoes. Put the seed heads straight into a paper bag and store somewhere dry and cool.

During the winter, remove the husks from the seeds. I then store them in an airtight container in the fridge. These seeds will grow better as they're used to your soil and weather conditions. It saves money too – last year I saved £50 on sweet pea seeds.

Harvest your fruit and vegetables, then make soups, chutneys and jams to enjoy over the winter. There are lots of suggestions on the Web.

I leave all borders to be trashed by the winter weather, so that stems and leaves will rot down and feed the soil, but I remove anything that is wet and soggy. If there is any bare soil, I sow a green manure such as phacelia, which can be dug in when grown.

Finally, it's now the time to pot up hyacinths for colour and scent. They make lovely Christmas gifts to brighten the winter months.

IN 1987 the United Nations defined the term sustainability as "meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to



meet their own needs." PEDAL and other local groups have promoted transitioning from fossil fuels to try and minimise our contribution to the climate emergency.

Sustainability and localisation of food supply was the reason for creating the monthly market in Brighton Park, encouraging shopping in Portobello to complement the fine range of food and produce shops. These form the hub of the town centre where we can find most of our foodstuff within a short walk or cycle ride.

The idea of an accessible town centre has led the council belatedly, after years of allowing out of town shopping centres, to come up with the idea of 20 minute neighbourhoods. Unfortunately, other factors are working against this initiative as not only are we losing the police station, but also our one surviving bank where you can actually go in and speak to a human being if you have a problem. Footfall is again growing in the bank and it would be a loss to traders and others who need access to cash facilities. Help stop the closure – search for 'Save our local bank in Portobello' and sign the petition (see story on the front page).

# POLICE STATION TO BE SOLD

THE police station on Portobello High Street, which has not had officers stationed there since 2016, is to be sold off by Police Scotland.

A public consultation was launched in January 2024 and got 116 responses.

Superintendent Murray Tait said: "Some respondents to the consultation expressed concern about crime during busy summer periods when the town sees greater visitor numbers. As part of our policing plan, we have increased police resource throughout the summer in Portobello every year and I would reassure residents this will continue."

# **GEORGE CINEMA – LATEST DEVELOPMENTS**

**THE** Friends of the George group (FoTG) has commissioned the award-winning Glasgow-based architectural firm Loader Monteith to undertake a detailed study of the feasibility of a community cinema, supported by a grant from The Architectural Heritage Fund. This will dovetail with an in-depth commercial and operational assessment, being undertaken by independent cinema consultants Mustard Studios, funded by a grant from the Scottish Land Fund. These latest commissions will help FoTG develop and refine its plans to save the art deco building and restore it as a cinema for the local community.

VE Schwab, the subject of this edition's Porty Profile (see page 2), is a major benefactor. Last year she offered funds towards the purchase of the cinema, based on a valuation by a firm of professional surveyors. The offer was rejected by the current owners, who have tried and failed twice in recent years to develop the site as flats.



# **SEA SWIMMING SHOCKER**

**SEA** swimming always been popular at Portobello, irrespective of the cleanliness of the water. In Victorian times modesty was probably of greater concern to swimmers than water quality and ladies in particular used bathing huts where they would change into their swimming costumes. The hut would then be taken down to the water's edge where the ladies could step directly into the sea, thereby preserving their modesty. Examples of these bathing huts can be seen in this image taken at made by the the bottom of Marlborough Street (then Wellington Street). Others, however, were not so modest as this complaint from Alfred John Last, Procurator-Fiscal of the Burgh of Portobello, in July noted that Portobello was still an independent burgh in with Edinburgh in 1896.

What punishment was meted out is unknown. but clearly such behaviour was deemed shocking and completely unacceptable. Whether bathing 'without wearing drawers or other Bathing costume' allowed before 'ten o'clock in the morning' may never be known, but it does give one pause for thought.

# AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

THE people of Portobello continue to give heart-warming support to the cases adopted by the local group of Amnesty International. At our Portobello Market stall on Saturday, 3rd August, sunshine brought out crowds and a rewarding 155 signatures for our petition calling for justice for Manahel al-Otaibi, a 29-year-old fitness instructor and women's rights activist, sentenced to 11 years in prison on a spurious charge of 'terrorist offences' by Saudi Arabia's notorious Specialised Criminal Court.

She was arrested in connection with her tweets in support of women's rights, and has since been held in solitary confinement and brutally beaten. A copy of the petition has been passed to David Lammy MP, Foreign Secretary, asking him to consider raising the case with Saudi leaders.

The weather was less than sunny on the evening of 20th July when, despite heavy rain, a full house turned up at Bellfield for the Amnesty group's showing of the film *Where Olive Trees Weep*, an insightful but heartbreaking inside account of life in Israeli-occupied Palestine, made before the current humanitarian catastrophe there.

the natural world, but there can't be many with a reputation to match that of the grey squirrel. Vilified for pushing out our native red squirrel, the grey colonised our parks and gardens after being introduced from North America – initially into grand estates in the 1870s, followed by a further (planned) release in the 1920s by London Zoo.

Grey squirrels are now ubiquitous wherever there are trees and a ready food

supply. They are supremely welladapted for city life, more so than reds. Spending more time on the ground, they supplement can their usual diet of nuts, berries, seeds, mushrooms and tree bark with the food we throw away. They are also capable of amazing feats


