PORTY FESTIVAL

PREPARE yourselves for the Porty Festival this May as scores of events kick off in the community.

Friends and co-founders of the new festival, Carmen Chalmers, owner of Support The Makers (which hosts the makers markets at Portobello Town Hall), and Sebastiaan Flurchard, one of the owners of Seb's Urban Jungle, came up with the idea of the festival a while ago, but on Saturday 10th and Sunday 11th May it will become a reality.

Portobello Town Hall will be the hub for the festival, with food wagons, a gin bar, and events such as a disco, makers market, yoga and talks taking place inside. Porty Panto will be performing, as well as a magician, circus, DJs and live music through the day into the evening. Unity Hair on Portobello High Street will be transformed into a vintage clothing pop-up shop and the beach will host judo demonstrations, wild swimming workshops and a dog show.

Carmen said: "Portobello is a community passionate about supporting local businesses, with the festival providing an opportunity for people to be involved, from hosting the events, to small businesses, charities and community groups being sponsors, and of course the community coming \overline{a} together to support everything that makes Portobello what we love!"

FIRST COMMUNITY SHARE ISSUE IN PORTOBELLO

ACTION PORTY has been drawing organisation to run a community share up plans to develop the Celebration Hall in Bellfield to better meet the community demand for different sized spaces, and improve energy conservation and accessibility.

The first phase of the project will cost £780,000 and Action Porty has been offered a grant of £450,000 from the UK Government's Community Ownership Fund (COF). However, the grant is conditional on being able to raise the balance of £330,000! Action Porty has been speaking to various other funders, but we anticipate needing to raise between £100,000 and £200,000 by running a community share issue in April.

Community shares are an innovative way for local people to invest in what matters to them - in this case Bellfield. Action Porty converted to a charitable Community Benefit Society (effectively a community co-operative) two years ago, to enable the

issue. The process involves producing a community share document which will set out the offer in detail.


Buying a community share is a withdrawable, non-transferrable investment which will provide vital capital for the development of Bellfield, and crucially help Action Porty release this COF grant. A successful community issue will also demonstrate community support to other potential funders, as well as further strengthen the democratic control which the community has over Action Porty.

Action Porty had tremendous support when we acquired Bellfield on behalf of the community, and is relying on the community rising to this new challenge equally well. Check the Bellfield website for further information.

69 BUS ROUTE RETURNS

THE 69 bus service is back. Reinstated by popular demand, the circular route via Lady Nairne, Bingham, Portobello High Street, Moira Park, Northfield, Willowbrae Road and Paisley Avenue passes several schools, libraries, supermarkets, GP surgeries and pharmacies. The bus used on the route carries 15 passengers and is fully accessible for wheelchair users. Note that the service operates on a hail-andride basis, where there are no formal bus stops. Just put your hand out when you see the bus and the driver will stop when it is safe to do so. Fares are £2 for adults and £1 for children. Concessionary bus pass holders travel for free. ready to meet members arriving off the bus for the lunch and social club held in the Church Hall.

POPP's clientele are isolated older people living locally, who are offered the opportunity to get out of their homes, share a meal and enjoy the company of others, with a varied programme of activities, such as quizzes, games, entertainers and outings.

Rose was born and brought up in Clydebank. She trained as a nurse in Glasgow before moving to Edinburgh where she specialised in orthopaedics. In 1999 she moved into NHS management and was involved in the early planning of the new Royal Hospital for Children and Young People. In 2010 she decided to leave the NHS so she could spend more time looking after her newly-adopted son, but when he started school, she was keen to get a part-time job. POPP fitted the bill perfectly.

Rose has witnessed some changes in POPP over the time she's been at the helm. She says: "The need to support isolated older people remains as important as when POPP was founded more than 30 years ago. But the financial climate is definitely more difficult and it's a continual struggle to find the resources to keep going".

She also stresses the significant impact of Covid-19 and its lingering effects: "It was a very hard time for our members, some of whom lost loved ones and have struggled to regain their confidence since".

With a heavy heart, Rose has decided to retire in June. But after dedicating her time and energy to POPP for a decade, she now wants to spend more time with her family and cultivating her cut-flower garden and her vegetable beds. Patricia Scotland



LOST BIBLE RETURNED

ST COLUMBA'S Portobello charity shop volunteer Adam was surprised to find a donated bible that once belonged to David Shanley, a soldier from Baltimore, containing diary entries detailing his life on the battlefield. Adam started to do some research to return it to David's family. Finding his service number on a military database unlocked a wealth of information. Adam said: "He fought in World War




II, Korea, Vietnam and became a police officer in California. He was made a first lieutenant at 21 years old, was a major fighter in the battle of Guadalcanal and received the Award for Heroism during Saipan."

Eventually Adam located David's nephew Michael in Oregon and rang him. Adam said: "He became emotional and burst into tears – he was very close with his uncle Dave and looked after him as he became older. I popped the diary in the post, and two weeks later it arrived back where it rightfully should be, with David Shanley's family."

Alan says how the bible ended up in Portobello in the first place remains a mystery, so if any of our *Reporter* readers know, we would be interested in hearing from them.

NOW that spring is here, get your seeds growing. If you've bought compost, warm it up a little before sowing; I bring a bag of my own compost into the greenhouse the month before. Do the same outside, covering the soil with weighteddown black plastic or cardboard for a while before sowing, or planting young plants, in April.

A mistake I've made is not hardening off plants so that their leaves are tougher and can cope with a bit of slug or cold damage. I now tend to harden off seedlings on a table first, out of the way of slugs and snails for a week or so, then I move them to ground level for another week before planting out. It's a bit of a faff, but worth the effort. I also keep old net curtains to throw over if frost is threatened; once into June they're put away for next year.

New gardeners, look after your soil. It's very precious, so instead of artificial fertilisers, use homemade nettle or comfrey liquid. No herbicides either - weed instead; no fungicides - try milk sprayed onto leaves, and no pesticides - just let nature get a grip.

JANUARY,

IN more than 80 people, including children, took part in a wassail at the community orchard to bless the apple trees and encourage a bountiful harvest later in the year.

There was a bonfire, hot spiced apple juice and singing, ably led by Jane Lewis and the Portobello Community Choir. What started as an example of localising food production has sparked other projects such as the Neighbouring Orchard, enthusing people to grow what they want to eat. In an urban area we cannot become self-sufficient in food production, but there is great satisfaction in growing even a little food. The orchard also got a mention recently on Radio 4, by a contributor to Gardeners' Question Time.

Portobello is regarded as a sustainable community, with the Community Council held up as an exemplar. However, the last Community Council dwindled to just five members, so new enthusiasm and ideas are now required. There are so many other groups in the area, ranging from those managing large community-owned venues to a small group in the Brighton Place area looking at combined repairs. This means resources are thinly spread, but all these groups sustain our vibrant community. Why not join in?

HISTORY OF PORTOBELLO BY MARGARET MUNRO

Spring 2025

BURNS CLUB



PORTOBELLO Burns Club was instituted on 25th January 1892 and, in common with most clubs at that time, was a male only membership. The resolution to establish a club included "... the commemorating of Burns' birthday and the encouraging of the study of Scottish poetry ... this might be done by offering Burgh Schools for essays on Scottish poetry." By January 1893, 45 gentlemen had joined the club. Twelve prizes for knowledge of Burns' writing had been awarded to Portobello schools and Ξ were much appreciated by those receiving them. It was hoped more prizes would be awarded in the future and, indeed, the practice continued for many years.

One of the most significant ^E Burns suppers must have

been that held on Monday, 26th January, 1931, in Portobello Town Hall. Sir Harry Lauder attended and gave The Immortal Memory. The Reply to The Lasses was given by The Lady Margaret Sackville, a well-known society figure of the time. In the photograph The Lady Margaret is seated on the right of the front row with prizes to the children of the Sir Harry, resplendent in his kilt, standing on her right.

> When he rose to speak, Sir Harry was given a standing ovation, followed by a rendition of For He's a Jolly Good Fellow. The evening was described in the minute book as an "... epoch marking event..." with over 300 attending and ladies present for the first time. It further recorded that: "... his eulogy of the Poet was distinguished by its freshness of outlook and fervour of

expression." According to newspaper reports of the time, Sir Harry described Burns as: "A builder of song! A song that lives and grows and never dies ... Burns shows the world a true genius and we are all proud of him ... Burns left behind him an everlasting bond of friendship among Scotsmen the world over" and "he speaks the language of the human soul."

The Club was recently wound up and the minute books and various artefacts were given into the care of Portobello Heritage Trust. The last recorded minute is dated 29th November, 1993. Burns Suppers were held by the club after this but are not recorded. The minute books provide a fascinating and valuable insight into the history of the club and Portobello society.

PORTOBELLO Amnesty International Group will hold its popular annual book sale and coffee morning on Saturday, 12th April at Bellfield Community Hub, between 10am and noon. Hoping to break last year's record of over £1,000, the event offers books, baking, bric-a-brac and artworks. Meanwhile, ongoing group activity elicited a heartening response when pupils wrote 187 cards of support to political prisoners in Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Angola during the branch's Christmas 'Write For Rights' exercise at Portobello High School.

The group continues to support AI's unconditional opposition to the death penalty and is currently focusing on Alabama, USA, where six executions were carried out during 2024, the highest total for any US state. November alone saw five executions in the US within a week.

More than 70 per cent of countries worldwide no longer execute and that number is growing. AI believes the death penalty should have no place in a civilised society.



SEAFIELD CONSULTATION

THE City of Edinburgh Council is inviting people to share their views on the regeneration of Seafield into a new environmentally friendly neighbourhood. The plans for this narrow stretch of land include as many as 2,700 new homes, with 35 per cent affordable, to address the city's housing emergency. They also include a new promenade, a GP surgery and opportunities for new shops and workplaces.
