CROSSRAIL SERVICE FROM BRUNSTANE STARTING SOON

A HALF-HOURLY service from Edinburgh Waverley to Brunstane and Newcraighall Stations on the Edinburgh Crossrail line is due to commence on 3 June 2002, making this the first passenger mainline reopening with stations anywhere in Britain since privatisation. Another new station at Edinburgh Park (between Saughton and Newbridge Junction) is programmed to open in the first half of 2003.

The Crossrail service extends the existing Dunblane to Bathgate service through Edinburgh Waverley on to Brunstane and Newcraighall. The Monday to Saturday services from Edinburgh Waverly to and from Newcraighall will be half-hourly from 6am to 8pm then hourly from 8pm till midnight. The proposed Sunday service will run half-hourly from 10am-8pm.

The plans for Brunstane station include security cameras, lighting and improvements to the paths into the Magdalene estate and to Asda, B&Q and Big W. There is a park-and-ride facility at Newcraighall with approximately 600 parking spaces.

In the future, the Waverley Railway Project aims to re-open the line from Edinburgh Waverley to Galashiels and is being promoted by The City of Edinburgh, Midlothian and Scottish Borders Councils. The project has been given £1.8 million from the Public Transport Fund to develop the scheme up to the granting of statutory powers. The Waverley Railway Project in effect starts from where Crossrail terminates, at Newcraighall, and continues onwards to Galashields.



CROSSING OVERDUE AT MOIRA PARK

THE RECENT tragic death of an elderly partially-sighted lady on Portobello Road roughly halfway between Moira Park and Craigentinny Avenue has naturally revived demands for a light-controlled pedestrian crossing at Moira Park itself.

Many - including myself and Gavin Strang MP - have long argued the case for a crossing here, instead of the refuge islands. The latter only aid safe passage across this main road; the former should guarantee it.

This location is 33rd on a list of over 100 requested such crossings, after taking account of the doctors' surgery and sheltered housing immediately adjacent. Even the recent fatality will not move it far enough up the list to enable it to be funded from our current budget. I am not happy about the situation and I know this feeling is widely shound!

I will try everything possible to improve the position. It has

been a fruitless struggle so far, but I have the backing of other local councillors; indeed, Cllr Ewan Aitken lives almost opposite the site of the recent accident.

A report on this matter will go before the next meeting of the East Local Development Committee in the nearby Royal High Primary School on Tuesday 5th March at 7pm., which I hope will allow us to find a way of making progress.

PROMENADE PAINTING BACK ON PUBLIC VIEW

A PAINTING of Portobello Promenade by local artist Aidan Bremner was recently rescued from obscurity in a cupboard and can now be seen at Portobello Library. It was originally hung in The Refreshment Room at Portobello Baths and was taken into storage when the Baths were refurbished. Aidan has now made a loan of it to the Community Council for public display: 'I hope it finds a place where it can be seen in Portobello', he said. 'The Library would be great'.



The eight foot long watercolour painting/collage was created by Aidan in the early 1990s and features a fascinating collection of aspects of our seaside - the Promenade with its buildings, such as the Baths, the old power station, the Ferris wheel and the kilns and children playing on the sands; Aidan's alter ego, Buskar Willie, the one-man band, also makes an appearance at the left-hand end.

Although Aidan still has links with Portobello he now lives in Lagos, Portugal, where he produces paintings and sculptures for an exhibition each October: last year's exhibition featured fish and fishermen, landscapes and portraits of agricultural workers. He is also painting at a zoo, which he says 'has an especially nice environment for primates'.

On summer nights Aidan draws caricatures of tourists and locals in Lagos city centre, as pictured here. On the back of the sitter's chair is the slogan 'English spoken – American understood' which he says he took from a well-known postcard seller on Princes Street, Harry Tanter, another Portobello resident.

DOGS TO BE BANNED FROM PART OF BEACH

AS A first step towards the City of Edinburgh Council's planned submission to Keep Scotland Beautiful for a Seaside Award (Yellow Flag status) for part of Portobello Beach, as reported in our June 2001 issue, a pilot ban on dogs is to be imposed on one section this summer. A dog-free area is one of the requirements for an award. Following a survey of public



opinion last year, which showed almost 100 per cent in favour, including many dog owners, the ban will apply in the summer season, from May 1 to September 30, on the stretch of beach from Bellfield Street to John Street, and appropriate signs will be installed.

The submission, which was to have been made this year, for Yellow Flag status by summer 2003, has unfortunately been deferred. It was not possible to confirm that lifeguards would be in place for the season, but it is hoped that this problem will be resolved in time for a later submission, which could see Yellow Flag status granted for the 2004 season.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL ELECTIONS DUE

ELECTIONS for seats on Edinburgh's 36 Community Councils, which take place every three years, are due on May 30. Portobello Community Council, one of the most effective in the city, comprises 20 representatives of local groups and 20 individual members, so if you or your group would like to stand, the relevant forms are available from the Library and must be returned by April 29.

The Community Council is the place to find out what is happening in your area and take part in discussions and decisions on matters such as Promenade improvements, planning issues, litter, crime, local celebrations and lots more.

Over the last three years Portobello CC has collaborated with Portobello Amenity Society and others in many projects, including torchlight processions; the provision of information boards along the Promenade; additional Christmas lights in the High Street; the Sir Harry Lauder Garden and concerts; consultation on John Street paddling pool site, the refurbishment of the Promenade, and the proposed Seaside Award application; negotiations with City of Edinburgh Council to have Joppa Tennis Courts upgraded; and arranging hustings for elections of our MSP and MP. It is hardly surprising, then, that its 1999 entry won the Calor Gas Urban Community of the Year Award for Portobello, and its 2001 entry received three commendations.

Groups registered as members of the CC, but with no nominated representative attending meetings, include two local churches, political parties, and a youth organisation; please check whether this applies to your group. Apart from these, all other local community groups should consider whether they want to make a contribution to, and be involved in, wider local affairs. One Monday night a month is all it takes to keep up to date and have a say in what happens in Portobello.

BUS SERVICES TO NEW HOSPITAL

PORTY PROFILE 9 No.

MUSICIAN and composer Dick Lee moved from Stockbridge to Regent Street three years ago with his 11-year-old son Tom and his wife Anne, also a musician, and thinks Portobello is 'a great place to

Dick studied at Glasgow and Edinburgh Universities, Birmingham School of Music and Amsterdam Conservatoire; he has lived in Edinburgh since 1980 and taught wind instruments at several schools before becoming a full-time composer in 1997.

As a performer on recorder, saxophone and clarinet, Dick plays all kinds of music

from 20th century classics to folk, latin and jazz, and has played soprano sax with Highland piper Hamish Moore. He formed a swing band in 1980, now called Swing 2002, who have played at the Malt Shovel Inn, Cockburn Street since 1984, every Tuesday at 9pm.

Since winning the BBC Radio 2 National Big Band Competition with a programme of his own compositions, Dick has released several albums and been commissioned to write music for TV and film, dance and concert. His latest recording is with the traditional music band Bag o' Cats: Out of the Bag features inventive reeling rhythms from the Himalayas to Cairngorm.

In January 2002 he was one of 14 of Scotland's leading artists to receive a Creative Scotland Award from the Scottish Arts Council. The award will enable him to write a large-scale piece for four bagpipes (small pipes) and orchestra, in five movements representing the north, south, east, west and heart of Scotland. He will spend time in each area, gathering musical impressions and playing with exponents of traditional music, giving performances and holding composition workshops. 'I'm delighted to receive this award, which is in effect a commission', he said. 'It gives me security for a year or so to concentrate on producing something big and worthwhile'

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RECOGNITION FOR DEDICATED CARER

AMANDA HEPBURN of Bellfield Street has won the Keith Matthews Memorial Award for outstanding diligence and excellent personal contribution to the caring profession. As Care Home Manager of Daybreak House in Marchhall Crescent, she has worked tirelessly to improve the lives of people with mental health problems.

The award is named after Keith Matthews, who ran care homes in England and who died in 2001. Nominations were received from all over Britain, but Amanda's dedication and professional practice left no doubt that the award should come to Scotland. Amanda received the award from Claire Rayner in London.

MAGNIFICENT SUM RAISED FOR MAGGIE'S

A BIG 'Thank you' comes from Malcolm Sutherland to everyone who helped to organise the ceilidh in aid of Maggie's Cancer Caring Centres on December 29 at the Town Hall, and also to the band 'Flaming Nora' who provided the music. 'I wish also to thank everyone who came along, who helped to create a great atmosphere and made it a great success on the night; it raised just over £1800, including some very generous donations – a fantastic amount', he says.

Including income from two coffee mornings and other donations, Malcolm, a former Portobello High School pupil, has raised a total of more than £3500, well over the £2500 for charity needed to enable him to take part in a walk along the Great Wall of China in his gap year before university. 'My thanks to everyone who supported me in this whole project', he adds.

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REDUCING BREAK-INS THE PRIORITY

THE MAIN priority recently has been to reduce the number of breakins: in December, 13 houses and nine businesses were broken into, and there were several cases of theft by slip-in, when criminals enter by unlocked doors while the family are at home. Teamwork by local officers, the Crime Patrol, CID and the specialised 'Magpie' team, plus additional uniform and plain clothes patrols in the worst affected areas, has resulted in a solve rate around 52% for January, well above our target of 32-36%.

Officers have delivered warning leaflets in hot spot areas, providing advice and offering free crime prevention surveys. Leaving a light on at night when the house is empty, locking doors even when the family are in, and reporting suspicious callers are all good practice. Breaking into and theft of cars is still a problem: park in your drive if possible, or in well-lit areas, and don't leave valuables on

Youth-related calls now account for 30% of all calls and of these, some 65% report youths being noisy or kicking a ball in the street. I am introducing a screening policy to enable officers to respond promptly when a crime is being committed or is likely; where noise alone is involved, details will be passed to the Community Team who will attend when available to liaise with residents and youths to try to deal with the causes of the problem.

Officers are also working with Community Education and other agencies to find a positive direction for our young people and reduce the level of anti-social behaviour.

Meadows Yard, Fillyside Road, is one of five designated LNRs in Edinburgh, all of which have legal protection under the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act

Councillor Lawrence Marshall expressed his pleasure at this development after eight years of community effort in conjunction with the Council and Scottish Natural Heritage. 'It's great that we've got this far', he said. 'Thanks are particularly due to Susan and Mike Burns and the other members of the Meadows Yard Management Group. I'm looking forward to the public declaration of the site as a Local Nature Reserve in May'.

THE BOTTOM LINE ON NAPPIES

GET REAL, an exhibition promoting the use of reusable nappies, was on show recently at Portobello Library, created by local resident Jane Lewis as part of her Millennium Award-funded project to set up an Edinburgh Real Nappy Network (ERNN). 'I used real nappies on my own child, and was inspired by real nappy projects elsewhere helping to reduce nappy waste,'

Disposable nappies are used by 85% of UK parents, resulting in a staggering 8,000,000 being thrown into landfill sites every day and taking from 200 to 500 years to biodegrade. As well as being good for the environment, real nappies are good for your pocket! Buying and washing these yourself can save over £600 for your first baby, and using a nappy laundry service costs about the same as disposables, but without the hidden costs to the local authority.

Modern shaped and fitted nappies in trendy styles, with Velcro and poppers (no more pins!) are convenient and easy to use. They are free from the chemicals present in disposables, and carry no greater risk of nappy

IUGH MILLER BICENTE

Hugh Miller was born in Cromarty on 10th October 1802 and by the time of his death by suicide in Portobello on Christmas Eve 1856 had become one of Scotland's most influential men. 10,000 people attended his funeral at the Grange Cemetery.

He was a renowned geologist and published hugely popular works on the subject but also wrote extensively on folklore and social and political issues. Miller became the first editor of *The Witness* newspaper in 1840 and was a leading figure in the events that led to the Disruption in the Church of Scotland and founding of the Free Church in 1843. He bought the small mansion of Shrub Mount in Portobello and moved there in summer 1854. Although the house and large garden have been absorbed by late 19th century development remnants exist between numbers 76 to 82 Portobello High Street.

William Baird writes in the *Annals* that Hugh Miller was a well-known and popular personality in Portobello and a regular member of the congregation at the Free Church in Regent Street. The workshop and museum he built at the rear of his house contained many specimens from Joppa Quarry, Niddrie coal pits and the brick clays and he delivered a number of popular local lectures on his work to large and appreciative audiences. An exhibition and a number of events are being mounted in Portobello as part of the countrywide celebrations to honour Hugh Miller's legacy.

THE SIMPLE idea of filling a shoebox with gifts and wrapping it in Christmas paper appealed to 10,018 people in Edinburgh, Fife and Lothians as part of Operation Christmas Child's Annual Appeal to send 'Love in a Box' to children in Eastern Europe. Local man Craig Paul tells of his part in the operation:

'I travelled to Vukovar, Eastern Croatia, in December and helped distribute over 4,000 boxes to children in schools, hospitals and orphanages who had suffered as a result of war. With unemployment at 99%, they would be the only present many would receive. I was privileged to watch the children open their boxes and express their delight: a brand new toy to play with; gloves to keep their hands warm in the bitter months ahead; chocolate - normally only seen on the black market and never tasted; a book and fountain pen to practise their school work with pride.

Many would share or swap an item with a friend. One teenage boy rushed over to his girlfriend in class and offered her his chocolates - he had never before been able to give her a gift. A football scarf would bring cheers from the boys who idolise our western teams.

In the orphanage, one boy showed me a photo of the person who had sent him a box last year. The kind stranger was his 'family' and gave him hope'.

BIRD WATCHING AT JOPPA ROCKS



RSPB SCOTLAND held a free birdwatching session at Joppa Rocks on Sunday February 10 to introduce us to the wildlife of the Firth of Forth - 'a magnificent spectacle right on our doorstep' as the publicity leaflet rightly said. They provided telescopes, binoculars and information, and RSPB warden Pete Gordon was pleased that, in the first hour-and-a-half, despite doubtful weather, about 50 people took advantage of the chance to see eider ducks, longtail ducks, velvet scoters, purple sandpipers, oyster catchers and grebe – great crested, Slavonian, and red-neck.

Around 25 different species of seabird can be seen here throughout the year and one that always catches people's attention is the cormorant, that large black bird that perches on the groynes and poles with its wings outstretched.

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ALTHOUGH MULCHING

around shrubs and plants can be carried out at any time of the year, it does most good in late spring. Fork or hoe the ground before spreading the mulch. If you have acid loving plants in your garden, such as rhododendrons or azaleas, avoid using spent mushroom compost. Although high in organic



matter, it also contains lime, which will cause severe damage to these plants.

To create a pleasing effect when planning a flowerbed or border, just follow two simple rules. First, put most of your tall plants at the back of the borders or in the centre of island beds; this will offset smaller plants at the front. Don't be too rigid though; a couple of taller plants amongst the small ones can give a striking focus and add extra depth.

Second, always group an odd number of plants together; groups of three, five or seven will give a much more natural effect than two, four or six.

Gardens can look pretty dull at this time of year, so pop in some primroses now to brighten up your borders and, again, don't be too rigid in your design.

Have a good gardening season.
