**ANNUAL BEACH CLEAN UP HIGHLIGHTS POLLUTION** 

**ON A MISERABLE** rainy day in April a group of 18 dedicated volunteers cleaned a section of Portobello beach as part of the Keep Scotland Tidy campaign. The annual clean up, organised this year by Edinburgh Councils People and Places Officer Dianne Smith in partnership with the Forth Estuary Forum with the Forth Estuary Forum and the Marine Conservation Society, aims not only to clean the beach but also to survey the kind of pollution found.

The

The Portobello clean up is one of thirteen similar events

along the Forth Estuary and the information is collated on a local and national level by the MCS and FEF who then use the information to campaign on litter and pollution issues on beaches. Local mother Sally Creighton brought her children Robin, 11 and Alice, 3 along to help with the clean up. "It's a learning opportunity for the children, they learn about the implications for the

environment and the wider oceans." said Sally. The volunteers collected over 30kg of waste in the 100 meter sample area, which included industrial and pedestrian litter as well as a fridge freezer. "The most horrible thing we found was some-one's thongs," 7 year old Murray Pride told the *Reporter*. "A huge amount of what we collected was human waste. Deeple have to be more responsible and store putting things down collected was human waste. People have to be more responsible and stop putting things down their toilets," said Karen Clulow one of the volunteers.

Local Councillor Maureen Child told *The Reporter*, "For the summer period, mechanical cleaning has started again at Portobello beach. Portobello and Milton wards are covered by their own task force team under manager, Robert Davidson, who is also responsible for the beach. The allocated resources would cover three wards everywhere else in the city and the extra money is in recognition that the beach requires more attention all year round. There have, however, been concerns raised by a number of local people about the level of cleaning of the beach in the winter months. While winter cleaning meets the standards set by the Scottish Environmental Protection Agency (SEPA), it may not meet the standards expected by local people and that is a matter I have taken up with the Director of Environmental and Consumer Services."

car'. The cars are meant to complement using public transport.

First remember the hassle and cost, maybe thousands of pounds a year, of owning your own car, then compare this. After signing up for £25, generally membership is £100 a year. That contributes to running the club, insurance, helpline, repairs, keeping cars new, local parking, washing and valeting! Up to 15 minutes before you need it, you book any of the Edinburghwide cars by internet (free) or phone (booking fee £2), for any period from an hour to a weekend. A smart card lets you into the car and off you go, returning it ready for the next booking. Monthly automatic billing charges you only for your use: £2.20 per hour and 15p per mile (petrol included) for the wee Corsa. For longer periods, really cheap hire is provided and your car is brought to you and collected afterwards!

We looked at some potential parking places: some will take little or no planning (eg St Marks Place), while others (eg outside the Town Hall) will take nine months official planning (more if anyone objects).

**SEA ART** 

**OBJECT**. THIS which was recently removed after spending two or three months at low water mark just east of the Rockville Hotel, evoked a lot of interest. It was an installation by local artist Ettie Spencer - a large metal crate containing 200 replicas of an electric kettle, cast in concrete. Ettie is interested in the relationship between our urban existence and the natural world: the kettles represented ordinary objects and she wanted to observe the ongoing changes in the concrete after it had been submerged for 50 per cent of the time. In fact the kettles turned partly green, and picked up rust from the crate and baby barnacles.

Ettie was pleased with the interest shown. "Watch this space", she says, "I may try other things". She will be exhibiting sculpture and paintings from June 3-28 at Gallery 21, 21 Rutland Square.

Community Centre in Adelphi Grove. A team of award-winning architects has set out a vision of a multi-user, flexible building bringing together existing groups and providing accommodation and support for new groups, to create a truly accessible community resource. Many options have been explored, including moving to a refurbished and extended Town Hall or linking with the Library.

The Centre is currently used by over 30 groups each week, providing services and facilities for over 600 local people and covering all ages and different sectors within the community; it also provides facilities for external organisations for events, seminars and conferences.

The Abbot/Atkins Study identified a clear demand for more services and the Management Committee has a clear and achievable programme for service expansion that would include health services. visual and performing arts, social and physical therapy, various youth activities and multi-cultural initiatives.

Centre Chairperson, Gillian Dunn said: "The Centre is an important resource for the people of Portobello and we in the Management Committee see it as our duty to improve and develop our provision for the benefit of everybody in the community. We need to find out what local people want and then set about achieving it. We are well aware that to take our plans forward will cost money and that a completed project will have to be financially self-sustaining, but we feel the people of Portobello deserve a first class facility."

The consultation exercise will take the form of leaflets, questionnaires, displays and public meetings.

# PORTY PROFILE No.10

**JOURNALIST** and broadcaster Maggie O'Kane has been *The Guardian's* special war correspondent for the past 10 years. Originally from Belfast, she took an Honours degree in Politics and History at University College Dublin and after working there for a while in Irish TV and newspapers, won a scholarship to L' Institute de Journalistes en Europe in Paris.

While there she was encouraged to travel around, and discovered that newspapers were willing to pay for reports from war zones, so she became a freelance covering Eastern Europe, the former Soviet Republics and Bosnia, before

taking up her appointment with The Guardian in 1992.

Maggie has won several prestigious awards for her work, including the Royal Television Society Documentary of the Year award in 1994 for 'The Puppet Master of the Balkans'; she was also shortlisted as Feature Writer of the Year at the British Press Awards in 2001.

Now, with a 5-year-old son, Billy, and another baby due in July, Maggie says she has had enough of war zones and wants more time with her children, so she has just become the Editorial Director of Guardian Films, the newspaper's recently launched documentary unit whose first production was 'The Last Days of Radovan Karadzic', shown on BBC2 on May 19. In this Maggie made an exhausting tour of all the locations where the indicted Bosnian Serb leader is said to have been sheltered by his supporters for the last seven years; despite her very direct, but polite, questions nothing was revealed. The next film 'Prostitute Murders in Britain', which includes a visit to Glasgow, goes out on Channel 4 in August.

Maggie's husband, John Mullen is Deputy Editor of the *Scotsman*, which is what brought them to Edinburgh and they moved to Portobello from Stockbridge two years ago. "We drove around Portobello one day and took a walk along the promenade", Maggie says, "and we decided that this was it – it looked like a place with a heart. It has a sense of community". She's also had a swim in the sea, and thought it was "great"!

## LOCAL YOUTHS GET INVOLVED IN CRIME PREVENTION

**IN RESPONSE** to concerns from members of the community regarding the general behaviour of local youths and their recent adverse publicity in the press, a need was felt for them to promote a more positive image.

At a meeting between community officers at Portobello Police Station and a local youth organisation, some of the members said they were keen to become involved, and the East Edinburgh Junior Crime Prevention Panel (EEJCPP) was born. There are six members of the Panel at present, all keen to show that the recent publicity was due to a minority. The aims of the Panel are to involve young people in local crime prevention issues and allow them to formulate ideas and initiatives on tackling youth problems in the Portobello area, to show the community that our teenagers have a positive contribution to make.

To assist the development of their ideas and to make contact with similar groups in the UK and abroad, and to access information on other tried and tested ideas, a computer for their use will be purchased in the near future. It is also hoped that Panel members will visit various departments at Police Headquarters, to examine different aspects of policing.

### COUNCILLOR CHILDS REPORTS

As a result of two development proposals in Bellfield Lane, I convened a meeting of local residents to discuss traffic implications and what measures might be put in place to minimise their traffic impact, if they went ahead. The result was broad agreement on traffic calming measures, waiting restrictions and a short stretch of one-way traffic restrictions, which were written into the planning conditions for both proposals, the costs to be met by the private developers. ## COUNCILLOR MARSHALL REPORTS

SCOTTISH POWER have announced that they intend to move from their premises in Fishwives Causeway by the end of February next year. While I regret the loss of local jobs, the fact is that the number employed by the company in Portobello has fallen over recent years, and some staff will at least transfer across the road to a new-build unit at Telferton.

For myself, I see this a once-in-a-lifetime as opportunity to de-industrialise this important gateway site to Portobello and, at the same time, address the concerns of residents in Baileyfield Road that they are being cut off from Portobello by a sea of industrial buildings.

While Scottish Power seem keen to dispose of the site as a whole and for offices, I feel that a mixed-use development would be preferable. This site potentially offers a solution to the fact that, for years now, around 2,000 folk have their names down for social housing in Portobello, while the annual turnover of such accommodation is probably less than the fingers on both hands.

I intend to see if a master plan can be prepared for this area - if possible including the surrounding industrial sites on Portobello High Street and the Recreation DSO compound and shed at Baileyfield.

**CROSSRAIL SERVICE** INFORMATION TRAIN THIS NEW SERVICE which started on June 3 runs between Waverley, Brunstane and Newcraighall as follows: weekdays: half-hourly in daytime and hourly in evenings; Sundays, half-hourly. On weekdays in daytime, trains run through from Bathgate, returning to Dunblane and calling at Haymarket in both directions; in the evenings, services are from and to Bathgate, but on Sundays there is a shuttle from and to Waverley only. Journev times from

Newcraighall are 11 mins to Waverley and 17 to Haymarket; from Brunstane,7 mins to Waverley and 13 to Haymarket.

Fares to and from Waverley or Haymarket are: Brunstane/ Newcraighall : day single, £1.40/£1.70; day return,  $\pounds 2.40/\pounds 2.70$ ; cheap day return £2/£2.30 (Mon-Fri. after 9.15 and avoiding trains from the city from 4.40-6.09pm); seven day ticket, £9.60/£10.80.

There will be an introductory offer of 50p per day, £1 for a week or £3 for a month on parking at Newcraighall (586 spaces).

Both new stations will have cycle-lockers and 24-hour on-line CCTV with Help Points where users can talk to the operator, requesting assistance or information.

#### LITTER BUGS **PAY THE PRICE** SINCE LAST JANUARY Edinburgh's new Environmental Wardens have issued 200 people, including some in Portobello, with $\pounds 25$ fixed penalty notices for a variety of offences, including dropping litter, failing to clean up after their dogs, and presenting domestic or trade

waste incorrectly or on the wrong

day. There are now 24 Wardens

patrolling the streets. Cllr Brian Fallon, Executive Member for the Environment said: "Let this be a warning to everyone; we will simply not allow people to continually disrespect our environment. The Wardens are doing a terrific job in targeting offenders in all sections of our community. But, just think how much cleaner our city would be if everyone took a real pride in their surroundings and stamped out such anti-social behaviour".

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# HUGH MILLER PLAQUE UNVEILED

**AFTER TWO DAYS** of fine sunny weather a damp drizzle greeted the guests who gathered on Monday 13th May for the unveiling of the memorial plaque at 82 Portobello High Street. Among the guests was Mrs Marian McKenzie Johnston, a great great granddaughter of Hugh Miller, who had come up from London.

Archie Foley, Secretary of Portobello History Society, introduced Professor Christopher Smout. Historiographer Royal in Scotland (pictured here), who was to perform the ceremony, and revealed that the decision to erect a memorial tablet in Portobello had first been taken 100 years ago. This was at a Hugh Miller centenary lunch in the Royal Hotel in August 1902 and William Baird had been given the task of making arrangements. What the caused the delay is unknown but thanks to generous donations from The British Geological Survey and the Edinburgh Geological Society we were here today to complete the task.

Christopher Smout is one of the most distinguished historians in Scotland and it is a tribute to Hugh Miller's achievements that he made the journey from St. Andrews to Portobello. He said that Miller was working in the study of geology, which at that time was at the cutting edge of science and its findings were challenging long held beliefs about the earth and



the creation of life. Miller was an inspired interpreter and communicator of his discoveries. His books ran through numerous editions and were 19th century best sellers. It was a tragedy that he ended his life here in Portobello, due to brain disease and the stress of overwork, while at the height of his powers and it was fitting that there should be memorial to him here.

After Professor Smout had pulled the cord to reveal the plaque the guests were taken on a brief tour to see the remnants of Shrub Mount, Miller's last home and then went for a reception and to view the exhibition at the library. Two other tributes to Miller were unveiled here. Alison Robinson had created

plaques memorial with designs based on fossil fish discovered by him. One shows a shoal of pterichthodes and michrobachius which are small armour plated fish with protruding eyes and the other portrays the mid dorsal plate of a larger fossil fish, homostius millerii. These plaques are made of paper clay, which is a mixture of stoneware and porcelain clays combined as a slip with paper fibres. When dry they were fired very slowly to about 1200 degrees Celsius. At this temperature the clay is vitrified and will not be damaged by frost. This is a very important attribute, as the plaques will be placed in the new frontage when the library is refurbished.

In at least one there were shots of the fairground, beach and promenade at Portobello. The

My wife Susan, nee Fenwick, was brought up in Portobello, where her father – Mr Eric Fenwick – still lives in Wakefield Avenue. He has lived there for 49 years.

We were given a rapturous welcome in Portobello NZ and the locals would welcome any form of contact, even a letter saying "Hello" would go down very well indeed. They are very proud of their Portobello Scotland connections.

Portobello is a small town/ village on the sea, with pleasant views over the channel leading up to Dunedin. The peninsula is the home for a small colony of rare albatross and penguins. Over to you!

DEATH OF LEGION STALWART FORMER President of the Portobello Branch of the Royal British Legion, Mrs Mary Darling Miller Rice, sadly died on May 5. Just weeks earlier, Mrs Rice, known to her family and friends as May, was presented with a Gold Badge and Area Certificate of Merit by Branch Chairman, Mr Jimmy McLeod, to mark the many years of service and dedication to the Royal British Legion Scotland and the Portobello Branch in particular.

May joined the WRNS in 1941, serving at Balloch and Londonderry before receiving a compassionate posting to HMS Claverhouse at Granton following the illness of her mother. In 1946, having returned to civilian life, she married Merchant Navy Seaman George Rice. Sadly, George died in

Nobody who was there could have been disappointed. Mr Rosie is obviously a complete master of his subject and has the happy knack of being able to pass on his own knowledge with apparently effortless ease. This talk was one of the Hugh Miller Bicentennial events held in Portobello and the History Society is proud to have contributed to the celebration. All credit to Joyce Campbell and the staff for staging the excellent exhibition at the library. We took part in the Local History Fair at the Thomas Morton Hall at the rear of Leith library on 11th May by putting on a display to illustrate Portobello industry and leisure. This was part of National Local History Week and attracted a sizeable number of interested visitors and would be well worth repeating as an annual event. **THERE** is always the riskfactor in spring when planting out bedding plants. If you took a gamble and planted your summer bedding this year in early May, your plants should have survived and will be showing some colour by now. If you waited until June, however, there is less risk of your plants being checked by late frosts. Plus they will, as



likely as not, catch up with the earlier planted ones. On the road to success, a little patience does no harm.

To ensure a succession of blooms, remember to deadhead regularly, and give the plants a feed with a general fertiliser. Roses will be revealing their beautiful blooms this month; a good feed now will ensure top quality flowers, so don't delay and enjoy the fresh colours and sweet scents. Remember to check the garden over regularly for pests and diseases and treat accordingly before they get a hold.

Feed vegetables also – beetroot, carrots, onions and parsnip - after thinning, with nitrate of soda at1/2 oz. to the yard run, and transplant field-grown leeks this month (June).

THIS recipe for their popular lentil soup comes from OOP! café, exclusively for Reporter readers! It serves eight.

- 1 tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 medium-large onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1 cm piece root ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- 250 grams red lentils
- 300 grams carrot, coarsely grated
- 2 litres vegetable stock
- salt and freshly ground pepper

1. Heat the oil in a good sized pan and soften the onions with the garlic and ginger.

- 2. Add the lentils, stirring well.
- 3. Add the carrot, stir again and allow to cook for a few minutes.
- 4. Pour in the stock, bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer
- until the lentils start to break up.
- 5. Season to taste and serve with warm crusty bread.



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
