N W PORTOBELLO **MASTERPLAN**

Objections aired at public meeting

OVER 250 people attended a public meeting, arranged by the Council in conjunction with PCATS and the Portobello Masterplan Action Group (PMAG) in the Town Hall on 14th November, to hear about the progress made in drawing up an urban design framework for this area of Portobello, which covers the Fun Park, Pitz and Baileyfield North sites (including the former Scottish Power site.)

The consultants, C2WTa, who are preparing the design framework for the Council, were present to answer questions arising from the public exhibition of their draft ideas in the library in June. These include the building of about 1,000 residential units in this area, in blocks of varying heights, including a row of five ten-storey flats alongside the Sir Harry Lauder Road and housing on the Bridge Street car park. They also want to move both the Library and the Community Centre onto

the Pitz site.

Ian Campbell, a member of PMAG, questioned whether the consultants really understood the existing character of the area, and where the pressure was coming from for such overdevelopment which would overshadow many existing houses and create huge traffic issues. Other people also raised the same questions.

Strong feelings were expressed that the Library and Community Centre should remain in the centre of Portobello and that, while there was a need for varied housing, particularly affordable housing, high blocks of flats did not suit the area's character. A need was also recognised for the proposed artists' workshops, but with a careful balance between residential and workshop units. Several Baileyfield Road residents made the point that their houses did not feature in the proposals, while others were concerned that the proposed housing in

Bridge Street would result in a serious loss of parking for residents, visitors and shop-

Alan Henderson, Head of Planning, stressed that the consultants wanted to listen to the views of the public, that community input was vital if the final design framework was to be acceptable, and that concerns which were important to residents should not be overlooked.

The revised design framework will be presented to the planning committee in December before going to public consultation in January and February. Our local councillors have asked for copies to be placed in the library, and it is vital that people look at the revised proposals and let the planning department know if they still have concerns. If they are not what local people want, then they have to use this opportunity to say so.

KINGS ROAD ROUNDABOUT

AFTER the disruptions caused by the work at Milton Link and Duddingston Park junctions, road users will have some welcome respite before work begins on the Kings Road roundabout. This has now been put back to late February or early March. Alternative routes to Portobello High Street will be signposted and, where possible, traffic signals will be adjusted to ease the flow. The Council will distribute information leaflets around the area nearer the time. The work is expected to take 20 weeks.

CYCLING ON PROM



THE Vox Pop on cycling on Portobello Prom in our last issue sparked a number of responses, none of them in favour. The following is a typi-

cal example:

"I use the Prom every weekday morning and evening and can assure you that the number of cyclists using it has grown to unacceptable levels. Given the number of 'No Cycling' signs, there can be no excuse for anyone mistaking the Prom for a cycle path. Too many cyclists brush past pedestrians with only inches to spare and most of them are travelling at a fair speed. Do we have to wait until someone gets hurt before the 'No Cycling' signs are enforced?"

According to the Council's City Development Department, under the Roads (Scotland) Act, 1984, Portobello

Promenade from Westbank Street to the Joppa end, is designated as a 'road' restricted to foot passage only and cycling is prohibited, as indicated by the signs. A police spokesman, however, said that before enforcement action could be taken, the Council may be required to have enacted a local banning order and this is still unclear.

Cyclists presumably use the Prom because they feel safer than on the roads, and the Spokes Cycle Map of Edinburgh does include it as a cycle path on which it may be necessary to dismount. For years people have turned a blind eye to careful cyclists, but it appears that an increasing number of inconsiderate ones, who pedestrians feel are a threat to their own safety, are causing real concern.

WORK DELAYED HUNDREDS OBJECT TO

WELL over 500 objections to the application by Viridor to build a waste transfer facility on the former freightliner terminal on Sir Harry Lauder Road were submitted to the Council's planning department by the deadline of November 5th. Local councillors also received hundreds of e-mailed objections.

Diana Cairns of the campaign group PONGS (Portobello Opposes New Garbage Site) and Cllr Maureen Child were interviewed on BBC Radio's 'Good Morning Scotland' and on ITV News on November 2nd.

WASTE TRANSFER PROPOSAL

PONGS have asked for the application to be conducted as a Hearing, so that each side will have the chance to put their case and be questioned by members of the Planning Committee. This is not expected to take place until well into the New Year.

Meanwhile, Friends of the Earth, PONGS and other groups are calling for a longterm strategy for waste handling across the region before any individual applications are approved.

SNUB TO PORTOBELLO IN our Autumn issue we reported that the Council had used a

photo of North Berwick beach on the back of its A-Z of Council Services, to illustrate the "Stunning skylines and sandy beaches" of Scotland's capital. When asked why a photo of Portobello beach was not used, the following rather puzzling explanation was given: "The A-Z subsidises its budget by attracting advertising

income from relevant Council projects and external organisations. The advert on the back page of the publication is from the 'Edinburgh City Region Brand' project. As a vehicle to promote the whole city region, it is appropriate that at least one of the images in such a Brand advert is of a subject from outwith the city's boundaries.... in this case East Lothian[but] both the Brand Project and the Council's own Communications Team... are well aware of the assets of Portobello and take every opportunity to promote our city's own seaside resort whenever appropriate". This was one opportunity they missed.

The people of North Berwick may be surprised to hear about their apparent incorporation into the 'Edinburgh City Region'.





ON THE BEAT

'BE SURE AT YOUR DOOR'

THIS is something we should all be. Portobello is a safe area, but if we all take extra precautions we can make it even safer.

Bogus callers are always inventing new ways of getting into people's homes to steal valuables or money. Always check who is at your door before you open it, and if you do not know or expect a caller, do not let them into your home, whatever they tell you. You should first check their identity, even if they say they are a police officer! Ask to see their identity card and if you are still not sure, look up the company in the phone book and call them.

Who is at risk and when? Many bogus callers call during the day, at times that you would expect workmen and service providers to call. Charity collectors call at more random times.

Don't let any casual doorstep workman do work on your property, for example roofing, tarmac for driveways or gardening.

Be aware. Be careful yourself and look out for neighbours. Ring them if possible to pass the word round, and if suspicious people are in the area, contact the police. PC Kenny Owen

LEITH: Following the success of their hovercraft trial in July, Stagecoach propose running a full service between Kirkcaldy and the Ocean Terminal at Leith, from summer 2009, depending on funding. Until that starts, they propose a one-hovercraft operation from Kirkcaldy to Portobello from late 2008, operating every 45 minutes at peak times and hourly at other

NO FUNDS FOR A NEW SCHOOL?

PARENTS with children at Portobello High School and its feeder primaries were alarmed recently by reports that there is no identified funding for a new High School, as they had been led to believe. At a recent public meeting at the school, however, local councillors, MSPs and Gavin Strang MP, all re-affirmed their commitment to that made by the Council, for a new school.

At its meeting on 25 October, the Council agreed to produce a fully-costed report and feasibility studies, early in the New Year, on the redevelopment of the school on Portobello Park. The Parent Council says it will be keeping up the momentum on the campaign.

THE **'PORTY SHOPPER'**

LOOK out for these reusable shopping bags due to be launched in Portobello at the end of January. The local environmental group PEDAL got a Council grant to buy these strong jute bags. They are hoping that traders will sell them for £1, and that people will use them rather than plastic ones. Arts producer Jean Cameron and Amy Wilson from the Scottish Arts Council spoke warmly about what Big Things has achieved so far and encouraged the group to build on its successes with Blue Moon, Projections and, more recently, Wonder- the three pyramids on Portobello Beach.

Plans for 2008 include the second year of our Public Art Commissioning Course, another temporary art work to be launched around June or July, and a Garden Gallery presenting a wide range of contemporary art in local front gardens from June to September. HOPEFUL PROGRESS ON KILNS

THE completion of makeand investigatory works allowed the architect and structural engineers to identify what further consolidation measures were required. These include: recording, numbering, dismantling and placing into safe storage the fireboxes in the 1909 kiln; removj ing vegetation growth on both kilns, carefully raking out and repointing with approved mortar where necessary; blocking

wall-vent openings to stop pigeons roosting; repairing existing metal strappings where required on both kilns to provide structural support and replacing the missing topmost strap on the 1906 kiln. The partially collapsed 1909 kiln will also have to be provided with an approved wallhead cope to protect the wallhead from

weather exposure and prevent water getting in.

Permission had to be obtained from Historic Scotland to carry out these works because the kilns Scheduled Monuments. This was granted at the end of October and, weather permitting, everything should be completed by the end of January 2008, at which time the scaffolding will finally be removed. With the structures suitably protected, consultation will continue with local groups and other agencies to determine the best repair options for the kilns.

appraisal. This is of particular import as far as this site is concerned. Once their report on repair options, programme and indicative costs is concluded it will be submitted to the Council's management for consideration and action.

A team including Council officers and representatives from the Architects and Consulting Engineers has spoken to two Assemblies at Towerbank School not only discussing the history, function and importance of the kilns but also highlighting the issue of public safety.

REMEMBER **NED BARNIE?**

W.E. Barnie, usually known as Ned Barnie, was one of Portobello's finest sons. He was also the first Scot to swim the English Channel, once in 1950 and twice in 1951.

He was a 'well kent' face in Portobello, where he lived all his life, and could often be seen swimming in the Forth first thing in the morning, rain, hail or shine.

THE THOMSON TOWER - HOME OF CURLING

THE Thomson Tower is a unique octagonal building located on the shore of Duddingston Loch. It was designed by W H Playfair, the famous Edinburgh architect, and built in 1825 by Duddingston Curling Society, whose members wrote the rules of curling which are still used to regulate the game today.

The tower was a curling house for the Society where they could meet and store their curling stones. It was also used as a studio by the Rev. John Thomson, the renowned Scottish landscape painter who was minister of Duddingston Kirk in whose land the curling house is set.

It was refurbished in 1978 by the Rotary Club of Canada and Duddingston Village Conservation Society but has since fallen into disrepair. Dr Neil's Garden Trust, which has responsibility for the tower, wishes to bring it back to its former glory because of its significance in curling history. It therefore proposes to renovate the tower and recreate upper and lower chambers within the building: the upper chamber to be used as an interpretation centre to tell the stories of the history of curling, Dr Neil's garden and the Rev. John Thomson, and the lower chamber to form a museum of curling displaying many of the earliest stones and other artefacts.

The project will cost approximately £250,000 with funding being provided by The Heritage Lottery Fund, Historic Scotland and The National Trust for Scotland and it is hoped work will be completed in 2008.

PORTOBELLO LAMPLIGHTER

WHEN we asked earlier this year for help to find the name of Portobello's last street lamplighter for an expatriate Portobello man in Canada some of our readers gave us not just one name but several. We are not sure that they date from the 1950s, which was the period our enquirer was asking about, but suggestions were John Cairns, Bobby Bell and Willie, whose

surname was not known but who only had one eye. One person from the 1930s is remembered in some detail, but only as Bob the lamplighter. He lived at number 18 Promenade and as well as being the lamplighter delivered rolls for the local baker and helped Tammy Lamb the rag and scrap merchant when he did his rounds in his horse and cart.

WOMEN'S CORPS TIMBER REMEMBERED

MRS Rhoda Paton, 84, of Portobello was invited with other surviving members of the Women's Timber Corps (WTC), to attend the unveiling on 10th October of a memorial statue, in the Queen Elizabeth Forest Park near Aberfoyle, to the women recruited in the 1940s to cut and trim trees for the war effort. The statue by Fifebased artist Malcolm Robertson, is a female figure in WTC uniform with her right hand raised to her face in what appears to be a salute.



Rhoda thought it was a wonderful sculpture, but said she was disappointed that she didn't meet anybody she knew.

The WTC in Scotland was set up in May 1942, as part of the Women's Land Army and Rhoda Duff, as she then was, joined the girls and women from all walks of life, who were recruited from the age of 17 and posted throughout Scotland. They replaced the men who had gone to war and most of the timber they prepared was used down the mines. Rhoda says: "I thoroughly enjoyed every minute. It was a fantastic life."

The Corps was disbanded in August 1946 and has had no official recognition until now and no representative at Armistice Day Parades until recently. In fact, they had become the 'Forgotten Corps'.

PORTOBELLO HISTORY SOCIETY NEWS



E-MAILS FROM GEORGIA

"I heard one Rotarian say he wished people from the government were here to see it. He said: 'How can 70 kids from all over the world come together and celebrate their differences, tease each other and have fun, whilst the supposed leaders of the world can't come together without getting into conflict' ".

There are challenges, however, not least the local gun culture: - "I knew people would have guns in the south but I didn't realise the extent... On the third day I was here my hosts wanted to take me shooting at the target range, fair enough. They both have 60+ guns, madness. Even my host brother who is 11 has four of his own".

But southern hospitality is strong: - "My host families are great. They have looked after me well, and are making sure I'm getting well fed. Food comes in mammoth sizes. Yesterday I ordered a salad in a restaurant, and this huge bowl comes, fit for a family of five. I ate just half, making me a family of two and a half."

Calum recently went to a Highland Games, taken by his 'host mother', who is into all things Scottish. She's even found him a supply of Irn Bru.

MUSIC REVIEW:

Salsa Celtica, Town Hall, Portobello

A coup for POD (Portobello Open Door), and a potent shot of Scots-Latino energy for the town hall: the inimitable Salsa Celtica played Portobello on 26th October.

The by now infamous blend of Latin beat and Scottish folk wooed the local audience, and Portobello's municipal auditorium became as steamy and swinging as any Havana jazz club.

Gig goers were treated to brimming jugs of Sangria at the bar and were encouraged to get up on the dance floor for some complimentary salsa coaching before the band hit the stage. The hall itself was moody in candlelight and decked out in delicate paper butterflies reminiscent of a García Márquez fantasy.

Far from jarring, the bold balance between musical styles creates an emotional alliance that moves the listener between delight and desire. The result is a heart-swelling, foot-stomping sound experience that sweeps revellers at this Cuban style ceilidh from reel to mambo.

The eleven piece jazz-folk fusion outfit marries brass and banjo, celtic pipes and congas, fiddles and vocals, and the musicians themselves further add to this collision of cultures with members hailing from Venezuela, Scotland, Cuba and Ireland.

POD are keen to plan more big nights that fill venues and bring top quality performance to the people of Portobello. "The true feeling of community in Portobello should be cherished and developed and the area needs to be given a higher profile", they say.

A GREENHOUSE is a great place in the winter to 'play' in, especially when the weather turns wet and cold. Give it a good clean and bubblewrap before January at the latest - I move out any spiders or ladybirds and use environmentally friendly washing-up liquid. Move tender plants in over the winter and the new growth in February/March can be used

for cuttings, especially from geraniums or marguerites.

Don't use the greenhouse to store things that could be kept outside - those tall cold frames make better storage for pots and so on, but can also be used to over-winter plants with a bit of extra bubblewrap. Wash pots and trays too - it is a bore, but anything done now makes the spring rush more manageable.

Order seeds early to get the exact varieties that you want. I'm a great fan of the Organic Gardening Catalogue, from 0845 130 1304 or www.OrganicCatalogue.com. Try something new or a new theme. Some years I try only scented annuals or very tall ones - it's great fun experimenting.

Now is a good time to move plants, trees or shrubs as long as it's not frosty. Hardwood cuttings are the easiest way to propagate roses or buddleia, in fact any deciduous shrubs are worth trying - I was successful with a quince. With secateurs, cut between a half and one metre length of shrub, about pencil thickness, and stick it into the ground to a third of its length. I take off any leaves along the length but leave a tuft like a pineapple at the top. The soil has to be well draining, so as our Portobello clay is good for pots but not for cuttings, I use the kitchen garden where the soil drains more freely.

After one year you can move the cuttings to where you want them to grow. In a small area you can squeeze them in about 20cm apart each way - a cheap way to get a buddleia hedge, for example.

Check any stored vegetables such as potatoes or carrots, and fruit such as apples or pears (best eaten before Christmas) for rot and throw any rotting fruits to the birds.

Finally - A few apples studded with cloves make a great natural room fragrancer over the festive period.

PORTOBELLO WILDLIFE WATCH
