

THE KILNS - TIME FOR JOINED-UP THINKING

AT the end of September, Murdo Macleod, Group Leader, Property Conservation and Chairperson of Edinburgh Council's Kilns Working Group, confirmed that both kilns are safe and weatherproofed. An advertisement with a closing date of 23rd November to find suitable contractors to rebuild them was later placed on the council website.

The Group seeks a satisfactory outcome to the restoration project and a viable future for the kilns, and Mr Macleod said: "The issue of the feasibility of any role the kilns could provide in the redeveloped area could then be discussed, but this is also for the Planning process to have a view on, particularly as the proposed adjoining developer may have input into the adjacent landscaping etc, and as far as I am aware this has not

moved forward in the interim." It seems he was not informed of what was happening in another part of the council:

On 28th October, architects for the Fun Park developers presented design proposals, to be part of a Planning Application, to Portobello Community Council. They said they had discussed them with Council planners but were not given details

of any other council interest in the adjacent kilns or their surroundings. Earlier this year a report from the Working Group, detailing options for the kilns, had been sent to Dave Anderson, Director of City Development, whose department includes both Planning and Property Conser-

In addition, in its submission on the Portobello Urban Design

Brief in February, Portobello History Society informed Steven Hajducki of Planning that "various council and community members are currently actively participating in discussions on the future of the kilns..." There appears to be a lack of co-ordination between parts of the same department on an issue of common concern.

The Fun Park site and the kilns are so close that neither can be considered in isolation, and if the kilns are to have more than an ornamental future they must be part of a plan that includes the entire area of private and council land on either side of the Figgate Burn.

Now is the time for the two sets of council officials to talk and work together, with the developers and community representatives, to ensure a benefit

HAVE YOUR SAY

UNDER recent Scottish legislation local councils must give their residents the opportunity to influence how council and other services are delivered.

To achieve this, the City of Edinburgh Council decided to set up 12 Neighbourhood Partnerships which include representatives from the local community, the voluntary sector, the Police, Fire Service and Health Board, and local councillors. For Partnerships to be effective, however, people need to know what they do and how to contact them.

The Portobello and Craigmillar Neighbourhood Partnership has funding for services in three priority areas, to improve the quality of life of local people: Support for families, children and young people; Reducing health inequalities; Increased opportunities for employment and training.

Four other priorities are the responsibility of the city council: Improving community safety; Providing a sustainable, cleaner and more attractive environment; Improving and regenerating the local area; Establishing good transport links. Concerns about any of these can be channelled through the Partnership.

IT'S BUSINESS AS USUAL ON THE HIGH STREET

SINCE mid-November Portobello High Street has been closed between Fishwives Causeway and the Kings Road junction, but the rest of the road is open to traffic and shops, cafes and other businesses are open as usual.

Edinburgh council has publicised this widely, but diversion signs on approaches to Portobello are directing traffic away from the area and traders are concerned that their businesses will be affected in the run-up to Christmas.

Work to replace the roundabout with traffic lights should have been completed by the beginning of November, but temporary lights, installed to enable all five approaches to remain open, did not operate successfully. It was therefore decided to temporarily divert traffic along Fishwives Causeway, Baileyfield Crescent and Sir Harry Lauder Road. Measures required to put this in place caused the delay.

A council spokesman said that, subject to suitable weather conditions, it is still hoped to open the new junction to traffic prior to the Christmas holiday period.

VILLAGE SHOW

ROSEFIELD PARK was transformed into a village green on what was probably the sunniest afternoon in September as part of PEDAL Portobello Car Free Day. The afternoon's fun kicked off with a bike parade from Kings Road to Rosefield Avenue and culminated in the first POD Village Show.

The show, complete with bunting-festooned stalls, live music, and prizes for home baking and garden produce and a dog parade where Portobello pooches strutted their stuff, was

well supported by the many 'villagers' who turned up. Louise Kelly of POD said: "The tea-tent worked its socks off, keeping the crowds fed and watered and helped raise enough money to cover the costs of this free community event."

The PEDAL event was intended as a forum for people's ideas and enthusiasm rather than a fundraiser. Tom Black of PEDAL said: "The event forms part of a feasibility study that is being funded by the Big Lottery Fund under their investing in ideas programme. We have just received just under £10,000 from them for this."

Plans to repeat the successful event may be on the cards for next year. Louise Kelly said: "We hope anyone who didn't win one of the beautiful ceramic medals made by local potter Alison Robinson wasn't too disappointed and will be inspired to try again next year." Karen Combe

She is trained in health education and describes herself as "a community musician with a background in health projects", and has just taken this further with the completion of an MSc degree in Music in the Community at




Edinburgh University. Her degree project, which she carried out at St John's Primary School, was the use of music as a tool for the integration of new migrant children into primary schools.

Gica enjoys "being involved in the community and making things happen" and is the vice-convener of the arts and entertainment group Portobello Open Door, better known as POD. With her friend Jenny Gardner, she runs Fun Fiddle which she describes as "the opportunity for adults and children to learn to play the fiddle in a social and community setting". She also plays at ceilidhs and other events with The Belle Star Band, which she formed 14 years ago. This all women band is named after Belle Starr, a famous Wild West outlaw in the 1800s.

Gica comes from a German Jewish family and has been learning klezmer (Jewish wedding music) for the last eight years. She says: "This is my real passion and connects me with my roots", so five years ago she formed a klezmer ensemble, Celter Schmelter. She performed with this group at the Scottish Fiddle Festival - Fiddle 2008, at the Assembly Rooms in November.

In addition to all this activity, Gica has a family life - a partner Dave, and three sons Finlay, Herbie and Micha who are all musical and play various instruments. She has also just started a new job in Glasgow as a research officer at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama. She keeps fit by cycling everywhere and, when she has time, she tends her allotment in her parents' garden in East Lothian because, she says, "I just love food".

Winter 2008 History

PORTOBELLO UNITED DANCE CLUB

LORNA Davidson from New Lanark has asked for the Reporter's help: "I don't know if you'll be able to help or not. My mother has a small silver-coloured medallion, engraved with a dancing figure, looks like 1920s or 30s style, and the words "Portobello United Dance Club". It was found via a metal detector on our family farm in the Borders, but no one knows anything about it, or where it came from. By sheer coincidence, my mother, now 84, was actually born in her grandmother's house in Portobello, but came to the farm after she joined the Land Army in the Second World War, met my Dad, and has been there ever since. The person who found the medallion knew she was brought up in Edinburgh, so assumed it had something to do with her, but she doesn't remember anything about a Dance Club, and says it must have been before her time."

Lorna's aunt, Margery Curwen, sent photographs

of the medal and provided more family details: "My sister's name is Doreen Mitchell but she was born Doreen Scott in our grandmother, Ellen Young's house at 60 Bath Street, Portobello. Our mother was Ellen Scobie and she often talked about the Marine Gardens ballroom. In fact, her brother and sister, Jimmy and Greta, were instructors there. However, we know nothing about the medal or the dance club and hope you

can trace its origins."

Unfortunately the reverse of the medal, which is about the size of a ten pence piece, has no inscription to say to whom it was awarded, but the markings confirm that it is sterling silver and was assayed in Birmingham in 1926. It may not be possible to find out how the medal got buried near St Mary's Loch but does anyone have information about Portobello United Dance Club?

SUFFRAGETTES MARCH IN PORTOBELLO

MARY KELLAS is researching events in and around Edinburgh concerned with the campaign for votes for women prior to the First World War. One of the first things she wanted to find out was the accuracy of a story she had often heard from her mother about a day when hundreds of Suffragettes, led by the prominent author and veteran social reformer, Mrs Charlotte Despard, had marched through Portobello.

She found the first confirmation of her mother's story, rather surprisingly, in The New York Times of Sunday 13th October 1912. There was a paragraph in a brief account of the start of a Suffragette march from Edinburgh to London the previous day:

"The procession stopped to take tea at Portobello, three miles from Edinburgh, and then marched another three miles, where it disbanded."

There was no mention of Mrs Despard but Mrs Kellas was indeed correct to say that she was there. In a very detailed and extensive description of the events of Saturday 12th October, including the enormous rally beforehand in Charlotte Square, The Scotsman of the following Monday said that Mrs Despard was to the fore, marching behind the banner. Only five women were to march all the way to London to deliver a petition to Prime Minister, Herbert Asquith but they were supported by



many others on each of the stages. The Scotsman reported that 120 supporters took tea at the Marine Café before going home and about 50 carried on to Musselburgh where they disbanded. Mrs Despard also left the march here.

According to The Scotsman many of the marchers were given overnight hospitality in homes in the area and it is likely that some, perhaps Mrs Despard and other important figures, lodged in Coillesdene House, Joppa. [Many will remember the large red brick mansion, with its idiosyncratic observation tower, before it was demolished and replaced by the tower block of the same name in the 1960s]. This was the home of the very wealthy Mrs Marion Grieve, who was an active campaigner for the right of women to vote, and Mary Kellas thinks it unlikely that she played no part in the march. Tradition has it that Mrs Grieve used to take stones from the beach at Joppa in a large handbag on demonstrations. She is certainly on record as having taken part in a large demonstration outside the Houses of Parliament but no mention of her throwing any stones.



Winter 2008 History

FULL CIRCLE



IN our 2008 issue we described how local potter, Alison Robinson, organised the transportation from Stow to her studio in Bridge Street of the parts of a completely dismantled potter's wheel that had been taken out of the Buchan Pottery when it closed in 1972. Now, we are pleased to report that after cleaning, oiling and a bit of improvisation all the pieces have been reassembled and the wheel is again in full working order.

Alison is thrilled that after 36 years pottery is once again being created in Portobello using an original Buchan wheel. "It was the skills of John Munro along with the help and knowledge of Arthur Jeffery, who worked at Buchan's using a similar wheel, that made this possible," she said. "What I would really like to see is the wheel working in a more appropriate setting such as a workshop or visitor centre by the historic Buchan kilns celebrating Portobello's past". THE PORTOBELLO *ADVERTISER*

OUR predecessor as provider of local news still has a fond place in the memory of many folk, as shown by how often we are referred to as the Portobello Advertiser in conversation and correspondence. Perhaps this is not surprising given how long it served the local population.

The Portobello Advertiser first appeared in 1864 and its full title was the Portobello Advertiser, and Leith, Musselburgh and Dalkeith weekly news. Its first publisher was a Mr C Merrilees but by 1887 it was printed and published by Thomas Adams, Printer, Tower Street, Portobello, and Penicuik had been added to the list of towns whose weekly news was thought to be of interest. In 1897 it merged with the Edinburgh Advertiser and continued as the Edinburgh Citizen and Portobello Advertiser until 1938. For 1938 to 1939 the name altered to Portobello Advertiser and Edinburgh Citizen. Then it changed again, this time to Musselburgh News and Portobello Advertiser. Warwick and Sons Ltd had bought over the Adams printing and publishing business in Tower Street in the early 1930s and continued to publish news from both communities, but over the years Musselburgh content came to predominate.

In the changed conditions after the Second World War circulation fell and Warwick's accepted an offer to buy both papers from Scottish County Press, which was expanding by acquiring small local papers in the Lothians. By the sixties the reference to the Portobello Advertiser was, and still is, in small print beneath the main title, so one way and another it has lasted over 100 years.

Local newspapers are a great resource for historians but until recently it was extremely annoying and frustrating for those wanting to consult archive copies of the *Por*tobello Advertiser to find that the early ones were stored in the Newspaper Library of the British Library in North London. However, thanks to the NEWSPLAN 2000 microfilming project, most copies from 1867 onwards can be viewed in the National Library of Scotland on George IV Bridge. This is not a Lending or Reference Library like the Edinburgh Central Library across the street and anyone wanting to consult the microfilm would need to apply for a Reader's Ticket at the front desk. Back issues of *The Por*tobello Reporter are in bound volumes in Portobello Library and online at www.porty.org.uk.

PORTOBELLO HIGH PUPIL VISITS SPACE SCHOOL

BEN WILCOX a sixth year Portobello High School pupil was lucky enough to be one of fifty Scottish students chosen for an all expenses trip to Houston in September, sponsored by Careers Scotland. This is his story.



After a day at Space Centre Houston we popped across the road to Mission Control at the Johnson Space Centre and met Gene Kranz, the legendary flight director who was responsible for Apollo and other missions, seen with me in the photograph. He talked about his work and how he became involved in the Space Programme. We watched the film *Apollo 13* in Mission Control and sat at the desks where he and his team had worked when saving the lives of the Apollo 13 astronauts and where they were responsible for the mission when humans first walked on the moon!

We visited many different parts of NASA including a zero gravity facility, a huge swimming pool in which full scale mock-ups of the International Space Station (ISS) and the Space Shuttle were submerged! We also had a chance to use the shuttle simulator; I landed first time! We watched ISS mission control live and had the opportunity to see state of the art research facilities including a gigantic temperature chamber used to test equipment.

Sadly our Space School programme was cut short by 'a small weather issue' – Hurricane Ike! A mandatory evacuation had been ordered, so we left the coast for central Houston to wait for it to pass. As Ike began its final approach we watched its progress on TV and finally went to bed, ready for a rough night. Fortunately I slept through the hurricane! In daylight we could see the damage that Ike had inflicted – our power and water were down, many windows of the buildings around us had shattered and trees and branches littered the road.

Our 'once in a lifetime experience' had turned into two very unforgettable ones. Many new friendships had been made. A trip never to be forgotten.

In District Rotary, comprising 62 clubs, Portobello pupils came out top in two of the three categories of Young Technologist competitions, with others performing well in Young Musician, Golfer and Photographer. There are also plans for Youth Speaks and a primary schools quiz. In addition, the Club sponsors students on Rotary Youth Leadership weeks and a Challenge Enterprise Weekend.

Malcolm Macmillan, President of Portobello Rotary Club commented: "It gives us Rotarians great satisfaction to see young people from our local community have the opportunity to develop their many talents."

IT can be windy during the winter, so I use old tights, cut into hoops as giant elastic bands or lengths tied together, to support climbers; they are remarkably strong and stretch to fit, and are great if you don't have another helping hand to tie in a large shrub to a wall, for example. I ask friends to pass them on to me - another bit of recycling. Just think to yourself: "If I collect these instead of throwing them in the bucket, they could be useful".



Blackcurrant, buddleia, lavatera and gooseberry prunings (but not evergreens), that can be cut pencil thick and about 20cm long, can be used as hard-wood cuttings. Propogating roses is particularly easy using this method - strip the leaves off and push the cutting into the ground to half its length. In a year you'll have wellrooted plants to transplant. I do about six of each to cover any losses.

If you haven't bubblewrapped your coldframe or greenhouse, then do it before January/February, which is usually our coldest time. It can allow geraniums and more tender plants and seedlings to survive the frost. I keep the wrap in place until a few weeks after the seedling stage, then remove it just at the time when the seedlings are needing more light but would have scorched if they had received full sun earlier.

A great job to keep you warm is to empty the compost heap (even if it hasn't completely rotted down) and spread over borders around fruit trees and shrubs; worms will take it down into the soil, so no need to dig. If any large bits offend your eye, pop them back into the heap until the next emptying.

Winter is a great time to plant out containerised plants. If you have wet clay soil then plant slightly higher on a small mound and then mulch. If planting shrubs or trees, I lay thick, wet layers of newspaper round them and then hide with the mulch.

Look at seed catalogues and order next year's vegetables and flowers ready for Spring - it's not that far away once we're into winter. Put some good, organic seed compost in a cold frame or greenhouse, so that it can be warming and won't chill the seeds when sowing. I put a large bucket of water in the greenhouse, too, so that it is not cold, straight from the tap. Don't use water-butt water for new seedlings until they're a few weeks old - you wouldn't make a newborn baby go into a cold bed and then start feeding it haggis, neeps and tatties....off the floor.
