The independent voice of Portobello **CYCLING BAN ON PROM ENDS**

THE largely ignored cycling ban on the Promenade has been discontinued, as legislative changes require it to be reclassified as a shared path, for both pedestrians and cyclists.

The Promenade is now part of the Edinburgh Core Path Network which was approved by the Council's Transport, Infrastructure and Environment Committee in May 2008, and the provisions of the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003 therefore apply. For full information see the Council website www.edinburgh. gov.uk and enter Cycling on Prom in the search box.

Cyclists, including the lobby group SPOKES, argued that, under the Act, responsible use of the Promenade is allowed to all non-motorised users, including cyclists. The Council are now considering how best to signpost



the Promenade to promote responsible cycling and meet legislative requirements.

They are consulting a number of groups affected by this change in legislation and a representative will attend the meeting of Portobello Community Council on Monday 26th September.

Whilst recognising that the Promenade is a safe route for cyclists, many pedestrians have concerns about their own safety, arising from their inability to hear when a bike is approaching. A regular complaint is about the lack of

a bell or use of one. The Scottish Outdoor Access Code tells cyclists: "Be considerate to other users of the outdoors such as walkers and horse riders; slow down and alert them to your presence".

If all cyclists follow that code, tensions should be eased.

PORTOBELLO BOOK **FESTIVAL**

FOLLOWING last year's hugely successful and popular event, the third Portobello Book Festival takes place from 7th to 9th October. Another busy literary weekend is planned in four local venues: Portobello Library and Town Hall, the Old Parish Church Hall in Bellfield Street and the Dalriada Bar on the Promenade.

The Festival will start on Friday 7th with two events for children, followed by an evening of music and words Let's Get Lyrical in the Town Hall, with a range of local musicians and wordsmiths.

Saturday will see a series of events and topics, including genealogy, creating your own comic book, the secret lives of buildings, keeping children 'hooked on books' and the Prestonpans Tapestry. There will also be open talks by local authors Millie Gray and Douglas Johnstone, as well as Candia McWilliam, and Janice Galloway whose talk has been organised for members of Portobello book groups.

Three events will take place on the Sunday: for budding writers, on getting ideas onto the page; on the life of Britain's forest; and finally, a debate on health, wealth and wellbeing, all relevant to the times we live in, with invited specialist guests and audience participation.

Events are free, but ticketed. Tickets and the full programme will be available from the Library from mid-September.

THOUSANDS of people thronged the Promenade on Sunday 24th July, in blazing sunshine, for The Big Porty Tea Time Welcome, organised by Big Things on the Beach as Portobello's contribution to a UK-wide celebration of the Cultural Olympiad 2012. Lots of people had made tablecloths on the 'welcome' theme to decorate the sea wall, and many enjoyed a picnic on the beach.

A portable football pitch and the library's story-telling bus were very popular with young folk, and young and old were entertained by the Commotion women's samba band. PORTY PROFILE No. 44 John Stewart

BORN and brought up in Portobello, John Stewart has a great love for the place, especially its Georgian and Victorian architecture. A strong desire to help preserve these fine buildings and safeguard local amenity has resulted in his involvement in several local organisations.

After obtaining an Honours degree in English at the University of Edinburgh and a Dip.Ed. at Aberdeen, John taught English for many years at Firrhill High School, which he says was "hard work, but



very enjoyable". He retired in 2009 and now has more time for his other interests, which include gardening, music and ceramics.

His community involvement began in1979, when Abercorn Amenity Association was formed by a group of people who lived round Abercorn Park, aka the Daisy Park, in the same year as Portobello was designated a conservation area. The group changed the name in 1981 to Portobello Amenity Society (PAS), to widen its monitoring of planning applications and roads and traffic issues, and now has over 250 members.

John became Chairman of PAS in 1993 and five years later he joined Portobello Community Council (PCC) as its representative. He now writes to Planning on major development issues on behalf of both organisations, and was elected Chair of PCC in 2008.

John also represented PCC in the campaign against a superstore at the west end of Portobello High Street, and PAS in the campaign against a waste transfer station on Sir Harry Lauder Road, giving evidence at both public inquiries. "The Council," he says, "doesn't always value the Portobello Conservation Area as highly as it should. The planning department actually recommended that the application for the waste transfer station be approved; fortunately the inquiry Reporter agreed with the objectors and rejected it." "Portobello is a great community with its own identity", he adds, "and I am delighted to be part of it".

When the City of Edinburgh Council produced the Portobello Conservation Area Character Appraisal in 2000, John wrote the sections on 'Georgian and Victorian Development'; he also wrote the text for a revised and extended Portobello Architecture Heritage Trail leaflet, just published by Portobello Heritage Trust and PAS.

When Portobello Heritage Trust was formed in 2010, to secure the future of the kilns and other local historical and architectural heritage, it was logical, given his interest and experience, that John should be asked to become one of its directors.

DURING the summer, Lothian and Borders Police's annual Promenade initiative, Operation Drift, focussed primarily on antisocial behaviour on Portobello beach and Prom. Police officers on foot patrol were a common sight on the beachfront, as well as PCs McLennan and Piears patrolling on their bicycles. Local crime prevention officer PC Graeme

A number of under-age youths believed to be in possession of alcohol or tobacco were stopped and searched, items were confiscated and, where appropriate, the individuals were reported.

Providing a police presence at the Rowing Regatta and The Big Welcome were some of the highlights for our officers, especially as both events were such a success.

Looking forward, to Halloween and Guy Fawkes night, we initiated Operation Draft in the Spring. This multi-agency operation follows the PIER model, and allows Police, L&B Fire and Rescue, City of Edinburgh Council, Historic Scotland, schools and university staff to Prevent, Intervene, Educate, and Review practice and procedures. In recent years this has enabled everyone to enjoy local activities, while minimising the risk of harm.

As the winter approaches, with increased hours of darkness, we would remind people that it is not uncommon to see a rise in house break-ins. Being extra vigilant about security can really make a difference, even simply putting an internal light on a timer to activate as darkness falls. LEARNING FOR WORK: 10 unemployed people living in EH15 and EH16 have



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

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HEAD OVER HEELS

WHILST his boundless energy is soaked up by hours of swimming, football and rugby, it's the exercise opportunities off the field that seem to hold the most appeal for my eight- year-old son.

The other day at the supermarket I caught a glimpse of his whirling form out of the corner of my eye, somersaulting over a nearby barrier that was at exactly the right height to satisfy his relentless desire to hang upside down like a fruit bat.

Before I could chastise him, the supermarket manager had spotted him and given him a ticking off, before giving me a stern glare. I left the supermarket wondering how I could explain to my wee dynamo, yet again, why his version of urban acrobatics was risky and antisocial, and got Mummy into trouble.

His antics stood out most when we were in Paris last year, where it seems that all the children are extraordinarily well-behaved. Admittedly, the low barrier beside the Mona Lisa in the Louvre is perfectly placed for letting off steam by a small boy trapped in an art gallery. My French isn't great, but it didn't need to be - I could tell from the guard's face exactly what he meant! Now I think I know why the Mona Lisa has that enigmatic smile: she must have had an unruly eight-year-old son, running around just out of her reach, brandishing Leonardo's best brush. No doubt my son will grow out of his loopy stunts but, in the meantime, I'm perfecting my enigmatic smile!



IT'S BULB planting time again. If you've nowhere to put new bulbs or can't remember where existing ones are in the borders (I regularly dig up bulbs accidently when putting in new plants), pop them into one litre pots until Spring. Remember to water them if we get a dry winter (some hope!) and then, when the spears of the bulbs in the borders start poking through, you can see where the spaces are and fill in the gaps. Remember that hyacinth bulbs need to be potted up and stored in a dark cool place until that pale 5cm volcano shape pokes out of the top. Then bring them into a slightly warmer place and await that fragrance.

All sorts of seeds are worth collecting now. I sometimes just cut down a whole stem, place in a paper bag and clean the seed off when I have time. Stored in junk mail envelopes, in an airtight container in the fridge, they must be labelled. Big seeds like sunflowers are easy to recognise, but other small ones are impossible to tell apart.

Hardwood cuttings are another regular autumn job. They don't need much space; not all will take, but five would take up just a small row if separated by 15cm. Take 500cm lengths, about finger thickness, with leaves stripped off and the top 10cm of soft growth removed, and push them about 15cm deep into well-drained soil. If trying willow or dogwood use an area with wetter soil. I use gaps where I've removed salad crops and leave the cuttings alone for a year before planting out. The rose cuttings I took two years ago gave a good show this summer, so definitely worth doing.

Once crops are harvested and turned into jams, chutneys, cider/ wine or frozen and potatoes are stored in paper bags, there will be bare earth, so either sow a green manure (mustard or phacelia works well) or try some winter salad crops - we may be lucky and get a mild winter. The manure can be dug in sometime in Spring, a little at a time if you have a bad back.

Bring in patio peaches or cover well, to avoid peach leaf curl which shows up as reddish, curled-up distorted leaves. The protection blew off my peach last year and it succumbed, so this autumn it'll go in the greenhouse where I'll keep it and hope to wall train it. The spores of this disease are carried in the winter/spring rain so protection must be waterproof.

Plants need to get ready for the winter shutdown, so sprinkle a handful of potash around the base of fruit trees and shrubs of dubious hardiness. This helps to toughen them up.

Our Open Weekend in August went well considering it was very wet and people gave generous donations, for which Mike and I wish to thank them very much. Hopefully next year the weather will be better.

The project was the fourth most supported of nearly 1000 across the UK and, as a result, we've been invited to submit a full funding bid. We have not yet been able to secure mains power for the market, but this hasn't stopped several new vendors selling delicious hot food, and many folk have enjoyed a picnic in the park on market day as a result.

Car Free Day is Saturday 24th September and coincides with Moving Planet Day, which focuses on moving beyond fossil fuels; see www.350.org. At 2pm we'll cycle from the 'cake stand' at the bottom of Marlborough Street to the beach near our potential turbine site at Seafield for some story telling. Kids are welcome, but this year you'll need to ask your parents to help you to dress up your bikes beforehand. Canoes and rowing or sailing boats are also welcome. PEDAL's work day and Autumn Equinox celebration is at the community orchard from 10am, so some of us will cycle from there at 1.30pm and be at the 'cake stand ' for 2pm.

You may have noticed local folk sporting this summer's musthave fashion item - our new T-shirts, available in two designs, 'I [heart] Porty' and 'Home Sweet Home' - can you work out the co-ordinates to locate 'Home Sweet Home'? You can buy the Tshirts at the market or on Car Free Day. Various colours and sizes are available.

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
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CENTENARY OF FIRST FORTH FLIGHT

30th AUGUST was the centenary of the first ever flight across the Firth of Forth, successfully piloted by W.H. Ewen in a monoplane which took off and landed in Portobello.

According to The Scotsman, at 7pm on 30th August 1911, dressed in black oilskins, William climbed into his Duperdussin monoplane, which was powered by a three cylinder Anzoni engine. It made a short run across the sports ground in the Marine Gardens and took off, just clearing the boundary fence. There was great excitement as many of the spectators had never seen a plane in flight.

Wind was causing problems and William flew to a height of 1000 feet hoping this would improve his prospects. He headed for Fife

with the wind behind him, flying over Inchkeith Island. When he reached Kinghorn he turned and headed back across the Forth. Halfway across the water, crosswinds again caused him problems, making the plane rock and dip.

William flew along the south side of the river until he saw the Marine Gardens and began his descent, intending to land in the sports ground, but it was quite restricted and wind was gusting. He did not want to damage his monoplane, so he landed in a field west of the ground. His machine was wheeled back to the Marine Gardens where he received a rapturous welcome.

The following Saturday evening, William was presented with an inscribed

silver bowl from the directors of the Edinburgh Marine Gardens (Ltd). He thanked them and said he believed that in two or three years everyone present would have flown, if not by themselves, then as passengers.

Previous attempts to fly over the Forth had proved impossible due to bad weather. William had been giving exhibition flights in the Marine Gardens, in Seafield Road, but strong winds had curtailed even them. He was determined to attempt the crossing, however, and did so when the wind died down.

William Hugh Ewen was born in Shanghai on 1st December 1879. His parents were Scottish missionaries who returned to Edinburgh in 1882. William studied at the University of Edinburgh

and gained a Bachelor of Music. He was a well-known organist and played at the Scottish Exhibition in August 1911. He gained his Royal Aeronautical Certificate flying in a Bleriot monoplane at Hendon on 14th February 1911. His certificate was No. 63, making him one of the earliest flyers and one of the first Scottish pilots.

He then established the first Flying School in Scotland in Lanark, and a second in Hendon. He was very involved with his company W.H. Ewen Aviation Co. Ltd. By July 1912, William was delivering airmail. Hebecame a Lieutenant in the Royal Flying Corps in November 1915 and transferred as a Major to the Royal Air Force in April 1918. He died on 26th November 1947.




IT IS with great regret that I have to report that Portobello History Society was dissolved on 1st June 2011. Portobello District Local History Society was founded in 1987 and the name was later changed to Portobello History Society to allow a wider range of subjects to be included, reflected in the diverse and informative talks greatly enjoyed by members. Editions of Past Times, giving information on the history of Portobello, were published between 1991 and 1995. The popular video, 'It Always Seemed to be Sunny' Memories of Portobello, was produced in 2004 by society members and sold well locally and worldwide.

At the AGM in 2010, the Treasurer and Secretary members that informed they would be retiring at the AGM in 2011 and hoped this would provide ample opportunity for new officebearers to come forward. In February 2011, the Chairperson indicated that she would also be retiring. With a healthy membership of 75, it was hoped that new office bearers would stand for election at the 2011 AGM, but no nominations were received and the remaining committee members then also resigned.

Members had been informed at the May meeting that if no new office bearers were elected at the AGM, it would be followed immediately by an Extraordinary General Meeting to decide the future of the society, thus ensuring that the EGM would be quorate and able to take the necessary decisions.

After lengthy discussion it was agreed to dissolve





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the society as detailed in the constitution, with its financial assets passing to Portobello Amenity Society (PAS). It was also agreed that all equipment and the care of the archive would pass to Portobello Heritage Trust. PAS has since transferred the money to the Trust.

where they stayed until Bill died in 1980. José remained there until autumn 2009, when she moved to Queen's Bay Lodge.

José was an active member of St Mark's Episcopal Church and had many friends there. She played golf regularly, becoming Lady Captain at Portobello Golf Club, and enjoyed swimming, diving and bowls. She also practised yoga and could do the splits until well into her nineties.

José and Bill had two children, and José now has four grand-children and four great-grandchildren.

NEW MINISTER AT BAPTIST CHURCH

THE Baptist Church in Portobello welcomed their new minister, Rev. Andy Scarcliffe, on 2nd July. The Portobello church is the third in Edinburgh that Andy has led, the last one meeting in a gym in Corstorphine instead of a traditional building.

Music has always been his passion, and he has played in various bands over the years. His first spawned members of Slik and Simple Minds, while his own path led to the Church.

"We sometimes speak a different language from the man in the street", Andy reflects, "using words that are hard to understand for those who have

never experienced church. I am excited about the fact that decline in church attendance is surpassed by an increasing interest in spirituality. We want to create a space for people to explore spirituality without pressure. I have ideas about what that might look like in Portobello. Watch this space."

Andy is developing a style of worship that draws heavily on the visual, incorporating video clips and songs, with tunes from artistes such as Dylan and Leonard Cohen. "If you want to check out what's happening", he says, "the church is on the High Street and meets at 11.00am and 6.30pm. You are welcome".

WHAT'S GOING ON AT WILSON MEMORIAL?

IT'S 4.45pm on a Friday afternoon and the church is buzzing with adults and children, laughing as they struggle to glue googly eyes on a cottonwool sheep. Portobello Library provided display stands and a table for literature and publicity, and made books with a human rights connection available in June and July. Our special leaflet was prominently displayed, which contributed to a significant public presence at the Group stall on 25th June near the Town Hall.

This ensured a great response to the case of Ferhat Gercek, a young Turkish man shot and seriously injured by police while handing out leaflets in Istanbul three years ago. Over 30 people signed greetings on a large card, beautifully illustrated by one of our members, and many took cards to send, calling on the Turkish authorities to ensure he receives justice.

We hope to have an Amnesty stall at the Portobello Organic Market on Saturday 1st October, and a commemorative tree-planting will take place at the Community Orchard on Saturday 29th October, which it is hoped will be attended by local political and community figures.

On Monday 17th October, Mike Perrins of St Mark's will lead the Group in a workshop on "answering awkward questions".

Our special events and local networking with churches and other bodies have resulted in an increased membership, and visits from people passing through, including a delightful couple from Detroit USA, both Amnesty members, with whom we shared experiences of human rights campaigning.

A PLUMB JOB FOR EMMA



FORMER Holy Rood High School pupil Emma Brown has graduated as a Gas Safe plumber after four years of study at Jewel and Esk College. She is the third generation of plumbers in her family and now works alongside her father Chris in the family business, established in Portobello by her grandfather Douglas.

Women plumbers remain under-represented in the industry and locally Emma is one of only a handful of women who have chosen plumbing as a career. She says: "I was in a class with 15 guys at college. Now, when I'm working on a building site, everybody takes a second glance when they see a female plumber on the job."

Being female has its advantages. Emma says she loves to chat and can quickly build a rapport with her female and elderly customers and put them at ease. The down side of the job is the heavy lifting and the under-floor work which can be claustrophobic and Emma says with a smile: "It wrecks my hair."

A more rewarding aspect of the job for her is gas work, including fitting and analysing boilers. It is technically demanding and in college, tough assessments required consistent 100% pass rates. Emma says: "Now I know what I'm doing, I can discuss things with my Dad. We have a conversation about work and Mum just can't believe it."

There were also three children's aquathons and two adult races of 400 and 800metres off the beach at Joppa.


ONE OF Scotland's leading swimming and water polo clubs is looking for new talent as it prepares to celebrate its Centenary next year.
