CREATIVE TRIBE

TRIBE PORTY is a new creative hub that opened in Portobello in the spring of 2015. Local people and groups can hire space to work in a creative environment with like-minded people or can give or take classes. Many of the activities are focused on health and well-being, while others provide opportunities to learn arts or take part in music and drama groups.

Social entrepreneur Dani Trudeau thought of setting up the Community Interest Company after undertaking an online survey which showed there was a lot of interest in more creative workspace in the area. She gave up her job and secured £10K of Big Lottery Awards for All funding, which, together with £12K of her own money, was used to convert the upstairs at Earthy in Windsor Place into the creative hub she has called Tribe Porty.

One of Dani's first endeavours was to host a TEDx event. TED (Technology, Entertainment and Design) are talks given by leading thinkers on topics as diverse as confidence building and

organically grown architecture and TEDx is its community version. There are almost 2,000 TED talks online that have had over one billion views. The Tribe Porty TEDx featured publicly nominated speakers who made their presentations to a live audience, while others could watch a live video stream of it elsewhere in Portobello before it was posted online. Another

TEDx is planned for May and a TEDx Youth event may be on the horizon.

Tribe Porty is one of a growing number of social enterprises being established all over Scotland, with Edinburgh alone having over 200. Like all social enterprises they must promote social good and any profits from their activities have to be ploughed back into the

enterprise or community. "We have a strong belief in connectivity, in health and well-being," says Dani. "Finding all these healthy connections can help you thrive in health, in work and in creativity".

ARTIST'S AWARD

PORTOBELLO artist and environmental activist Juliana Capes has won the 2015 Society of Scottish Artists (SSA) Exhibition Prize. Her winning installation, Aquifer, consists of a large number of balloons that playfully interrupt the viewers expectations. By including water when they were inflated they hang down rather than float up. The work was exhibited at the Scottish National Gallery, Princes Street, in December and January.



"It's great to be recognised by the Society," says Juliana of her award, "and I'm looking forward to the opportunity to make an ambitious installation for the fantastic spaces of the National Galleries in 2016." In addition to being supported by the SSA in this endeavour, she will be a featured artist in next year's exhibition and is also creating new work for this year's Cupar Arts Festival and Leith Late.

SETTBACK - Council decide against re-laying setts

THE Council's Transport and Environment Committee decided to remove the setts in Brighton Place and re-lay the surface with asphalt, at their meeting on 12th January. They rejected a Council officer's recommendation, went against Council policy for conservation areas - and reversed a previous decision to re-lay the setts.

Based on their 2015 consultation, Portobello Community Council had made strong representation for the removal of the setts and for the laying of asphalt. This would make a saving of £400,000 which is not trans-



ferable to any other budget, but will remain in the roads budget to be used around the city. The setts will be stored and used on other setted streets in Edinburgh. Sean Gilchrist, Roads Renewal Manager, said: "The work is estimated to take around 16 weeks, depending on the type of traffic management agreed." No planning permission is required to remove the setts, which have never been completely re-laid within living memory.

Vic Michel, representing Brightons and Rosefield

Residents' Association, Portobello Amenity Society and Portobello Heritage Trust, made a presentation to the committee in support of re-laying the setts. At the same meeting the committee approved the Proposed Capital Carriageway Programme for 2016/17, which included re-laying the setts in High Street, South Queensferry.

Following the decision an online petition for re-laying the setts was launched on the website 38degrees.org. uk There will be another meeting of the Transport and Environment Committee on 15th March.



PORTY PROFILE No. 61

MAE says she had a "brilliant" send-off at her recent leaving do at the Pleasance marking the end of her 25 year career as a senior lecturer in Community Education at the University of Edinburgh. However, with a book out soon, the Portobello Book Festival, journal editing, lectures, hill walking and her renewed interest in singing, she is as busy as ever.

Born and brought up in Northern Ireland with two brothers and a sister in the midst of the Troubles, for



Education, particularly fair access to education, has also been one of Mae's guiding principles. She left school at 16 after doing O-levels, and began working in an office. "I was quite a good shorthand typist", she says, "but I was always doing night classes - art, philosophy, politics. Then I heard you could get into teacher training as a mature student with a good interview". Spurred on, she did an A-level and then studied primary school teaching at Stranmillis College, Belfast.

After graduating, however, Mae was keen to spread her wings and went to London for the summer, where her secretarial skills came in handy. Then she heard that the director of the Citizens Theatre in Glasgow was looking for a secretarial assistant and worked there for a year, which was "a fantastic experience".

Mae returned to London to work as a community worker, then after a few years she came to Edinburgh to study on a post-graduate course, the same course she ended up teaching on after working for Edinburgh Council of Social Service for eight years. She moved to Portobello when her son was about to start school in the early 90s, and says: "It's a vibrant place to live, a mixed place, and I love being near the sea."

Alongside her career, Mae was a folk singer and performed regularly on the folk circuit and says: "I was involved in an organisation called Left Turns about bringing music into politics and politics into music and went on a singing tour in 1986 to East Germany".

As one of the founding members of Portobello Book Festival, Mae is delighted that it remains free and inclusive. "A major move forward would be if we could get a care home as a venue, so it's about getting deeper rather than bigger".

ON THE BEAT

AN issue with speeding motorists on Joppa Road was identified by local residents last November and reported to us. In December 2015 and January 2016 PC Sean McGarvey ran a local operation to address the issue, when he also addressed general safety on the roads, especially during winter months.


STRONGER COMMUNITIES



NEIGHBOURHOOD PARTNERSHIP

YOU DECIDE! Last year's process to allocate the Portobello and Craigmillar Neighbourhood Partnership's Community Grants Fund of £21,737 gave the decision to local people. Nearly 500 voted in the libraries, by post and in person to decide which of the 29 applications would be successful, and 17 groups won an award.

This year voting will take place in Portobello Town Hall on Saturday 14th May from 1-3 pm. To encourage people to turn up, see what's on offer and engage with others in the process, there will be no library voting. NEW PARK for EH15. After nearly six months of public consultation on the design and naming of the park, Craigentinny and Duddingston Neighbourhood Partnership will make the choice at its meeting on Thursday 17th March at 6pm in Parsons Green Primary School.

PORTOBELLO COMMUNITY COUNCIL

HERE'S a brief overview of PCC involvement in local issues in the last few months and what's coming up in 2016.

The City of Edinburgh Council received a Proposal of Application Notice in December for a "Residential development, new primary school, new local centre including retail... community facilities, parkland and associated infrastructure" at the Brunstane site identified in the new Local Development Plan. Developer EDI Group will hold a public consultation at Kings Manor Hotel on Tuesday 8th March, 3-8pm. Information boards and feedback forms also available in Portobello Library. For more information see www.edigroup.co.uk/new-brunstane

On 12 January Edinburgh Council's Transport and Environment Committee voted to replace the road surface of Brighton Place with a full asphalt reconstruction, contrary to council policy to retain setts. Your responses to our consultation helped inform the decision.

A planning application to replace the existing signboard on the historical use of the Promenade was submitted in January. Fantastically, all costs were met by Scotmid Community Projects funding.

The CEC is reviewing Portobello's Conservation Area Character Appraisal. This defines the key elements, features and qualities that contribute to an area's architectural and historic interest. Unlikely to change significantly, new research will focus on the impact of recent development. Current timescales are to produce a draft by May for summer consultation (PCC).



TIM in the wine shop was intrigued by our wassailing event at the community orchard. Being an Aussie he was aware of indigenous peoples' seasonal rites but was amused with the idea of us continuing



with an old 'fertility' rite. You may not think that singing to the trees will make them bear more fruit, but over 70 local adults and children thought it was great fun. Hot spiced apple juice and cider wet the whistle for singing round the fire and there was plentiful home baking. We even sang our own wassailing song, the *Donkey-field Community Orchard Canon* composed from names of apples we grow.

It has been hard at times, but we now have a beautiful orchard for all the community to enjoy, young and old. In an urban area, we will never produce enough food to sustain us, but we are looking at other areas of Portobello for community growing. COMMUNITY IN ACTION

Kidz in Recovery provides fun activities and social outings for children whose parents are in recovery from addiction. THE BURNS SUPPER held on 16th January in Portobello & Joppa Parish Church Hall was a great success, with outstanding contributions from the top table and tasty traditional fare. £1765 was raised for Christian Aid, which was doubled by a contribution from a government fund, UK Aid.



GO OUT and look at the garden and imagine what you'd like to see - neat rows of veg, an eclectic mix of wildflowers, a beautiful sward of green lawn or just a tidy patch? Spring is a great time to decide, especially if you use your garden in the summer for sitting with a cuppa or a family/friends get-together. List what you will need to do to achieve something you'd like; no one else needs to like it, but it should match your lifestyle!

If it's veg you want, raised beds are great for lots of reasons and can be made from various bits of scrap; the internet can be a good source of inspiration. Then it'll be a choice of good, organic seed of the vegetables that you like and that will be successful in your microclimate.

WILDFLOWER MEADOW

If you want a proper wildflower meadow it will be hard work, just like a lawn, not an easy option. The spent foliage must be cut down and collected after it has seeded, so that soil fertility is not increased: instead of a lawn cutting every week of, say, a centimetre, one big cut of stems nearly a metre long will be required by September. To achieve a wildflower meadow in an established lawn buy the largest plug plants you can afford, flowers and/or grasses, and clear a patch 30cm square for each. Do this by edging the square with a spade and lifting only the top five cm. The bare earth around each plug can be sprinkled with annual seed of the wildflower mix of your choice. The most important plant is yellow rattle, which will weaken some of the grasses to give the flowers a chance to compete.

If you prefer a green sward, one tip that works well is to pee (and yes, I said pee) into a pot, add to a large watering can of water and sprinkle onto your grass; try it along a strip and see the difference. If you aren't so inclined, then order some seaweed liquid from the organic catalogue. This can be watered on and used on everything in the garden without danger of harming anything. I think most people have realised by now that the use of herbicides, pesticides and artificial fertilizers should not be used, due to increasing information about their effects, big subject I know. No *Silent Spring* by Rachel Carson for us, I hope; read it if you dare! I use *The Organic Gardening Catalogue*, www.organiccatalogue.com, tel. 01932 878570, who I've used for years and found excellent.

"LOVE AT FIRST SIGHT"



ELEANOR BROWN,

who lives in Italy, contacted Portobello Heritage Trust to tell us about her Granny who worked for AW Buchan of Buchan Pottery. After lengthy communications, an interesting family story emerged, beginning over 100 years ago.

Eleanor's Granny, Euphemia (known as Tot) Kirkwood Thomson, was born on 21st February 1887 at 9 Mentone Avenue. She was the eldest of four surviving children. She attended Towerbank School and left when she was 13 years old. We think the school photograph was taken in her last year at Towerbank. Tot is on the extreme right of the second row from the front.

She entered service with the Buchan household and worked her way up to become the cook. The Buchan's regularly held soirées for invited guests, when Mr Buchan played his violin. One evening a group of officers stationed at Piershill

Barracks were invited to dinner. Afterwards, one of the officers, Charles Addy, asked who had cooked the meal and Tot was sent for. After complimenting her on his meal, Charles asked if he could walk out with her and she agreed.

Apparently it was love at first sight and Tot ran off to London to be with him, something almost unheard of at that time. She found a job as a lady's maid and they were married in Woolwich Barracks on 27th August 1914. They can be seen together in the studio photo. Charles had made his career in the Royal Field Artillery and was a Lieutenant, but Acting Major, through much of World War One. He was awarded the Military Cross and the Greek Military Cross, possibly for his actions in Salonika.

They had two daughters, Dorothy and Helen, Eleanor's mother, and a son, Charles, who died from meningitis at only 18 months old. By 1923 Charles had been invalided out of the army with tuberculosis and the family moved from London to Dagenham and then Dorset, hoping the air would be better for him. Sadly, Charles died in 1932 leaving Tot to bring up the girls on her own and they returned to Portobello to start a new life. When Eleanor's mother went out to work during World War Two Eleanor's granny Tot brought her up. She died in 1960.

AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

OUR 2015/16 Greeting Card Campaign was rather limited, as the Portobello Market where we take a stall was cancelled due to bad weather and Portobello High School did not participate this time. At a street stall and a table in Bellfield former church, however, 82 cards of comfort and support were written and sent to three victims of human rights abuses in Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Iran.

At the Scottish Amnesty Regional Conference on 16th January, 60 members gave high priority to the raising of public awareness of Amnesty's work. One way will be to ensure that groups are working together more effectively, and the Portobello Group's first contribution to this aim will be to help the Edinburgh University Group make their Student Conference in March a success.

A number of new members in 2015 have brought fresh energy and ideas to our group, such as a Human Rights quiz in January in the Artisan Lounge, London Road. Our local businesses donated many of the prizes and our musician, Brendan, was an added attraction. As well as raising awareness of human rights, we raised over £300 for Amnesty's work.

WANT TO RUN A MILE?



FEELING stressed? Want to run a mile? Look no further than Portobello Promenade, where 'Measured Mile' markers have been set into the tarmac. Starting at Tumbles at the west end, the Prom is marked in distances of 200 metres up to 1 kilometre by the Community Garden, a 1500m marker can be found along Esplanade Terrace and a Mile marker (1609 metres) at the east end. The Coade Stone markers were made by local potter Alison Robinson

and funded by Portobello & Craigmillar Neighbourhood Partnership as part of the devolved roads budget.

WHATEVER your goal or reason for joining a gym, there are many benefits to using a lot of the different areas.

The cardiovascular machines, such as treadmills, bikes, rowers and x-trainers, focus on your heart and lung function and are important and encouraged for everyone. How long and how much you do varies for everyone; the main thing is that you are exercising and getting out of your comfort zone. When engaged in any of these activities you are aiming to increase your heart rate, and get a bit sweaty and out of breath. The results can be noticed quickly as your fitness level improves.

Next are the fixed-weight machines, which include leg press, leg curl, shoulder press and lat pulldown, for example. These have you in a seated position, offering more support so you can work specific muscles individually.

Free weights make up the other main area and include dumb-bells and barbells. Using extra weight adds resistance, making you work harder, and can be done standing or sitting. You are encouraged to stand as, by challenging your centre of gravity, you use a lot more muscle groups, including the core and other stabilising muscles (the smaller muscles that assist the larger ones).

Before using any of these areas, as always it is recommended that you get advice from an instructor.
