LOCAL TRAFFIC **CONTROL PROPOSALS**



The road blocks at Brunstane Road are set to be removed once the Brighton Place setts replacement works are completed.

THE re-opening to traffic through Brighton Place has been delayed a few days as the works were extended to include resurfacing of Southfield Place, which was not in the original contract. Lothian Bus services can revert to their original routes on Monday 9th December. Congestion approaching the King's Road junction for traffic onto Sir Harry Lauder Road should ease, and the longer easterly diversion via Eastfield to Milton Road will be removed.

Four weeks into the Brighton Place closure, residents in Brunstane Road were informed by the City of Edinburgh Council that their road would be closed at the railway bridge, under an emergency traffic order, for health and safety reasons. Vehicles of all sizes were causing gridlock in Brunstane Road and extensive tailbacks into Milton Road. This congestion was also significantly impeding traffic at the Milton Road/Sir Harry Lauder Road/A1 junction.

During the unexpected closure of Brunstane Road the council invited the residents of Brunstane and Coillesdene to an information event, held last month, which was very well attended. Most of the local councillors also met separately with residents in both Brunstane and Coillesdene. The council used this consultation to hear the views of a large number of residents from across the 'Joppa Triangle', the area bordered by Milton Road, Joppa Road and Eastfield, and Brunstane Road, which includes all the roads within Coillesdene.

The council is now reviewing all the issues that have arisen from this consultation, as part of a city-wide initiative to calm the passage of all vehicles and reduce the impact of pollution in the interests of everyone's health and safety, whilst also recognising the popularity of Brunstane Road as a link road within Portobello.

The temporary closure of Brunstane Road will cease when Brighton Place is fully reopened.

FIRST WORDS ... LAST LINES

Hustings organised by Portobello Community Council will take place on Thursday 5th December at 7pm in the Baptist Church on Portobello High Street. All five candidates will take part.

'PITZ' LATEST

IN 2017, the City of Edinburgh Council announced its intention to sell the 'Pitz' Powerleague site at Westbank Street for development. The council was to receive about two-thirds of the proceeds, which would go towards the re-development of the Meadowbank Sports Centre site, with the balance going to Powerleague, which has a long lease on the 'Pitz' site.

Public consultation on the proposal, under the Community Empowerment Act, was led by local group Action Westbank and the community's preferred options were relayed to the council.

Powerleague has recently invested in improving the facilities, with new energyefficient floodlights, a brand new 7-a-side pitch and a replacement 5-a-side pitch.

The council's Spatial Policy Manager, Will Garrett, said: "The Council appreciates the investment that Powerleague has made in the site. However, the Council is still considering its options for the site and is committed to working with the local community to achieve the best outcomes for Portobello".

COMMUNITY IN ACTION

'GUERILLA gardeners' have taken over a patch of land near the bridge in Brunstane Road, and the triangular patch in Morton Street. It was all started by local man Chris Cowie, who says:

"Soon after I retired two years ago I started on the Brunstane Road patch. Some neighbours came to help, others donated

plants and the project grew from there. When I'm working there people say how much they admire it when they're going to work or walking the dog.

"Then just over a year ago, after painting over graffiti on the police box at the Morton Street triangle, I was planting daffodils when a neighbour came along with some bulbs.

She contacted other local people and the result was a big 'plant in' with lots of local residents, from children to grannies. Passers-by have offered seeds and flowers, shrubs and cuttings have been offered on Porty People and Grow Porty and Portobello Amenity Society has donated £50 for more bulbs.

"A local man gave us an old mower, so we can cut the grass, another made wooden slats for the big bench and someone else donated a smaller one; they now sit either side of the rose bed.

The difference made to both sites by the neighbourhood coming together is tremendous. My personal thanks to all".



MARGARET DRYSDALE

ART-PHOTOGRAPHER.

arts and creative learning development worker and founder of the photography collective Women in Focus in Edinburgh (WIFIE), Margaret Drysdale has lived on the Prom with her partner Peter for over 25 years. Their home is full of examples of Margaret's unique inventive work, using scanners and collage to create delicate images reflecting her connection with the environment.

Margaret grew up with her brother and sisters on a smallholding in Strathyre,



Margaret came to Edinburgh to study photography at Napier where she met Peter. They established a photography business and were also photographers for the Edinburgh International Film Festival. Margaret began to teach photography to women's groups, eventually leading to a career in community education. She worked for the council as a community worker based at the Royal Edinburgh Hospital for over 20 years where, she says, she developed art projects to raise awareness of mental health issues and address stigma. In her current role, based in South West Edinburgh, she works with isolated people on projects such as Bikes for Refugees.

While studying for a degree in Community Education, a placement at the Adult Learning Project (ALP) gave Margaret an idea. "I was teaching Asian, African and mental health groups, but was keen to see if there was a need for women's groups without all these different labels". After much research, she founded WIFIE. "My aim for WIFIE was a space for women from all walks of life to have a voice". Seventeen years on and the collective has had many exhibitions raising awareness of women's issues through photography. They exhibited Stop Trafficking in the Porty Light Box in 2016 and are currently planning another installation as part of Passion 2020 Easter. "WIFIE also provides me with a space to be creative. On our website you can see Flowers Don't Cut It, which is quite typical of my work", she says.

One of Margaret's favourite ways to unwind is hill walking, and she enjoys taking visitors up Ben A'an in the Trossachs. "It's a tough climb, but when you get to the top you get fantastic views." She says that in a way Portobello reminds her of her upbringing in a small village. "It's not just part of a big city, it has its own identity, and has a beach as well"! Karen Combe

IT'S NOT JUST A JOB, IT'S A FAMILY

CITIZEN'S Advice Edinburgh (CAE) has had a bureau in Portobello since the 1970s, and has been based at it's current location in Bath Street since 2005. Over the years thousands of locals have benefited from the free advice given by its volunteers, who make up the vast majority of advisors, on a wide range of problems including welfare benefits, debt, housing, immigration, employment and consumer rights.

According to the manager, Sigita Danil, people don't always understand CAE's status. "They think we are part of the government but we are not, we are a charity. Because of that they think we are all paid and don't realise how much is done by volunteers."

Sheila Shillitto, who has been a volunteer for over 12 years, enjoys her work. "People come with all these various problems and I just love solving them. You can see the relief when a client who has been struggling alone gets the support of an advisor fighting their corner."

Anna was made homeless following the conviction of her partner for serious offences. Lumbered with debt and having been in temporary accommodation with her three sons for six years, she turned to CAE. Money Advisor and the Portobello team had her debts reduced or written off and supported her as she rebuilt her life. "If it hadn't been for CAE and Sigita, I fear for where I might be right now," she told *The Reporter*: "They are unsung heroes, only they don't wear uniforms. Now I have a fantastic new flat and have managed to secure a wee job."

Sigita, who started out as a volunteer and worked her way through a variety of roles before becoming the manager in the Portobello office, says, "It's not just a job, it's more of an extended family. You meet people from so many backgrounds, different experiences and life stories. There's so much to learn from each and every one and then you can help others"

FOOD BANK FOR PETS



EDINBURGH Dog and Cat Home (EDCH), situated at the Seafield end of the promenade, has appointed its first in-house vet in its 136-year history. Dr Bridget O'Farrell will be partnered with local veterinary practices Abercorn and Braid Vets, providing additional support for the hundreds of dogs and cats that pass through the home.

Also new to the animal charity is the introduction of a pet foodbank. It is estimated that one million people live in poverty in Scotland, and feeding a pet is often at the bottom of the list. EDCH pet foodbank will provide wet and dry food, collars, leads, bowls and bedding to owners who need this service. Lindsay Fyffe-Jardine, Deputy to the CEO and Director of Operations at EDCH said: "The Home takes in hundreds of dogs and cats in need of a second chance, however, there are times where some of these animals are coming from loving families who can no longer cope with their care. We hope by establishing our own dedicated pet foodbank that we can keep some of those much-loved dogs and cats with their loved ones while continuing to support those in need."

BY the time you read this you may be thoroughly fed up with the General Election and the claims made by politicians on what they are going to do to make our lives

You may have recently completed a survey about which local sustainability initiatives can be progressed, and support is such that a workshop is to be held on Sunday 8th December at Bellfield from 2-4pm. A more relaxed attitude to lawn care, such as leaving grass to grow that bit longer and not using pesticides, herbicides or insecticides, makes lawns a great food resource for bees. A few flowering indigenous weeds will also help butterfly numbers - cuckoo flower for Orange Tips, for example. Who wasn't impressed with the Painted Lady butterflies we had this summer?

Seed catalogues are a great source of information, so include in your order a few plants recommended for bees and butterflies. Of the perennials, Michaelmas daisies attract butterflies and hoverflies in great numbers just when they need a top-up of food to overwinter and Buddleia, the butterfly bush, does its job as described. Only cut down perennials if they are looking mushy; I've used a battery hedge-trimmer or sharp shears in February to cut down dry stems.

Watch out for emerging bulbs and maybe cover with a bucket or similar to avoid standing on them. Split up snowdrops; I do mine either when they first emerge, are in flower or when flowering has finished but they are still green. They can be potted up easily, as a gift.

Use dreary days to tidy the greenhouse or poly-tunnel ready for the growing season. Empty the compost heap before clearing the borders and use the lovely stuff, rich with life, as a mulch. Prioritise the vegetable garden, then anything newly planted.

NATURE NOTES FROM PORTOBELLO

THE simple act of winding your clocks back an hour always seems to mark settling in for the oncoming winter. However, this can become one of the best times of the year to view wildlife. Leafless trees and shorter days mean everything is done more visibly and in fewer daylight hours. It's a great time of year to watch for Kingfishers. Their colours stand out against the muted palette and they travel further in search of fishing spots. It's worth looking along the Figgate Burn, and not just in parks. Some of my best Kingfisher views have been on Adelphi Place.

Finding a single little bird can be frustrating, so it can be easier to seek out flocks. Every year there's an influx from Scandinavia. Fieldfares and Redwings will make themselves known, but Waxwings are the undoubted stars. Portobello is an early landing point, and in recent years Abercorn Park has been amongst the first locations I've seen reports. These little punks give themselves away with constant chatter, as they pass from tree to tree stripping



them of berries, often oblivious to the humans watching nearby. A few have already arrived in the UK, so keep your eyes peeled.

LIFE RECORD

WHEN a friend showed me this photograph of a 78rpm (revolutions per minute) record he had bought it raised two questions. Why did the record have a stamp on it and where had Portobello Gramophone and Music Depot been?

Investigations reveal that the stamps were fixed to records as a form of receipt by the recording companies to show they had paid the mechanical copyright royalties due under various Copyright Acts and General Regulations. This evolved from stamping printed music with the composer's signature to show copyright. These stamps were first introduced in the United Kingdom in July 1912 and had stopped being used by 1939. Records were generally made of shellac between about 1898 and the 1950s, after which vinyl was used. The record, pictured, by Ambrose and his Orchestra was produced about 1930.

Post Office Directories show that Miss M.E.G. Moir ran the depot at 223 Portobello High Street

from 1926 until 1938. Previous to this it had been Elsmere Photographic Studio. 223 no longer exists, but was located on Portobello High Street beside Windsor Place Church, where the new flats are now.

Who was Miss Moir? Her home address was given as 25E Abercorn Terrace from 1926 until 1933, with her business address given as her home address from then until 1938. Mary Eliza Graham (M.E.G.) Moir was born on 17th May 1885 at 5 Leith Street Terrace, Edinburgh to Robert Moir, widower, a silver engraver, and Amelia Moir, widow of Alexander Burn, a mercantile clerk. Robert and Amelia were married on 27th December 1880. Robert was 52 years old and Amelia was 34. Her maiden name was Graham. Robert must have

been a skilled craftsman, probably making them a middle-class family. This might explain how Meg, as she seems to have been known, could afford to establish such a grandiose-sounding business. It was well stocked. Not only did it sell records and sheet music, but also an assortment of musical instruments, musical novelties and accessories.

It also appears to have been well known across a wider area than Portobello. Evidence of this is given in Tony Smith's biography of footballer Gordon Smith, where it states: "Since moving down to the big city, Gordon would browse all the record stores. In nearby Portobello he would visit Meg Moir's record shop ..."

Meg's death in the Royal Infirmary, from cancer, was recorded on 5th February 1938. She is described on her death certificate as a Music Dealer and single. She seems to have been a successful business woman, with customers coming from a wide area to buy their records and other musical requisites.

JOPPA RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

JOPPA Residents Association (JRA) was formed in 2014. It is open to all households in the Joppa area and welcomes new members. Our current main concern is the increase and speed of traffic through the Joppa triangle during the temporary closures of Brighton Place and Brunstane Road at the rail bridge. We have also addressed security problems, the condition and drainage of roads, pavement weeds, closure of Joppa toilets, and graffiti on street furniture, buildings and Morton Street footbridge, to try to make our area more pleasant and safer for all.

AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

THE AMNESTY International's (AI) Portobello Group continues to be highly active in gathering public support for human rights issues and cases of injustice across the world – of which there is, sadly, no shortage.

At the group's monthly stall at the Portobello Market, one issue that drew much positive response was AI's campaign to encourage the Home Secretary to keep the issue of refugee families in the UK visibly on the agenda, particularly with regard to currently restrictive legislation which hampers the re-unification of incoming refugee family members.


Dozens of shoppers wrote messages on this issue on a large card, which was presented to local MP Tommy Sheppard, ultimately to be conveyed to the Home Secretary.

At September's Portobello Village Show, the group collected 140 signatures supporting the right to work for asylum seekers. A further 17 people connected with local football left their contact details in connection with AI's "Football Welcomes" campaign. There was also an AI presence at October's Portobello Book Festival, with a display of posters spotlighting the plight of "disappeared" journalists in Eritrea.



HEALTH MATTERS

SLEEP MATTERS

WHEN people come to the surgery, they often ask what they can do to look after their health; it is a good question and one answer is to sleep more. 'Beauty sleep' is not an urban myth, we are indeed more attractive if we sleep well. But what really matters is our health, as sleep is our brain's cleansing system. The Sleep Foundation says that less than six hours sleep is not enough and suggests that there is an epidemic of 'insufficient sleep opportunity'. There is evidence that this is bad for memory, mood and blood pressure, and increases the risk of dementia and cancer. In fact, when the clocks go forward in spring the number of heart attacks rises by 24 per cent.

What can we do? Firstly, establish a pattern and keep to the same bedtime, allowing enough hours of sleep. Try having a soothing hot bath, and cut down on alcohol and caffeine as they can impair sleep quality. Dimming lights sends a signal to the brain to trigger the sleep process, and it is also a good idea to keep screens out of our bedrooms. And for insomnia, where anxiety is the commonest cause, don't just lie there tossing and turning, get up and go back to bed only when you are sleepy.

Shakespeare knew a thing or two and said of sleep that it is the "chief nourisher in life's feast".

PORTOBELLO GOLF COURSE SAFE - FOR NOW

IN 2018, Edinburgh Leisure (EL) announced that it was considering reconfiguring the 9-hole Portobello golf course into a 6-hole facility, including foot golf and frisbee golf. Following public consultation by EL and a petition organised by Portobello Golf Club for the 9-hole course to remain, however, EL has announced that the course is to stay as it is for the foreseeable future, with no change to the 9-hole configuration.

KEEP ON RUNNING

PARKRUN continues to draw large numbers to Figgate Park every Saturday morning, despite the cold. Volunteers turn up early to check the course and ensure it's safe. It has only had to be cancelled twice this year – once in August because of an unsafe bridge and once in October after heavy rain, when the burn was close to overflowing across the route.

Portobello parkrun has been going since April 2015, but parkrun itself is quite a bit older, having started in Bushy Park, London, in 2004. There are now over 600 parkruns across the UK, including over 50 in Scotland, with over 150,000 people taking part each week. For some people, part of the fun is in collecting venues, dropping in on parkruns wherever they happen to be – even overseas (there are now parkruns across most of Europe, the USA, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand and Japan).

For Portobello parkrunners, the nearest alternatives are at Cramond, Vogrie, Tranent or a newly-started one at the Oriam sports centre at Heriot-Watt University. But if you want to join the parkrun family with the minimum of travelling, Figgate Park remains the best place to go on a Saturday morning.
