THE GEORGE CINEMA – SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT REFUSES APPEAL

THE battle between housing developers Buckley Building Ltd and Council planners over the future of the old George Cinema on Bath Street appears to be nearing its end. Three attempts to persuade the Council to allow partial demolition and grant planning permission to turn the building into 20 flats have failed, including the most recent application which involved restoring key features of the celebrated art deco façade. The developers appealed to the Scottish Government to overturn the latest Council rejection, and a Scottish Government Reporter was appointed to make the final decision. Following a site visit on 27th April, she has now dismissed the appeal by the developers. The Reporter's decision is final although an appeal can be made to the Court of Session within six weeks but only on a point of law. Meanwhile, the future of the site remains uncertain. KILNS FUNDING UPDATE

AT A recent meeting with the City of Edinburgh Council's archaeologist, the directors of Portobello Heritage Trust were updated on plans for rebuilding the 1906 kiln in Bridge Street. At a report to the Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work Committee on 4th August, £172,750 was granted toward the rebuild within the Place Based Investment Programme for 2022/23. A grant application will be made to Historic Environment Scotland later this year for matched funding. If successful, this will mean that half of the estimated funding required to rebuild the kiln will be in place. The council will be exploring further grants to try to

secure the remaining half. Better protection for this kiln will be installed until work can proceed. It is hoped that annual maintenance on the 1909 kiln will resume this year.

KATE QUARTANO BROWN

KATE Quartano Brown says you never quite retire from being an

opera director, as there are always more opportunities to pursue. Born in London, Kate developed a passion for music and theatre at school where she sang in choirs and as a soloist. Music seems to run in the family, as her grandfather produced Gilbert and Sullivan, and her niece and nephew Sally and William Jaquet both have musical careers. She says: "When I went to Oxford, I was supposed to be studying English, but I did more singing than anything else."

After graduating, Kate trained as a teacher, before taking the plunge to study music at Graz in Austria. She speaks French, Italian and German, so opera was a good fit for her. She went for six months and ended up staying for four years and started directing small productions. "I really got into that thing of how to sing, and how to produce early theatre," she says. Kate's music teacher specialised in early music influencing her interest. "I have always been fascinated by scenery and costumes, how they would light, how they made the scenery. How did they look, how did they sing and act?"

Returning from Austria, Kate accepted a director role at Glyndebourne, beginning a prolific career at a time when there were few female opera directors. She was involved in many productions in the UK, Europe, and America. She also toured with the Scottish Early Music Consort. "We did no less than four full-scale operas and shows, for example Celtic Voyages which combined the ancient chants of Saint Columba with Scottish Gaelic songs and medieval music from Galicia in Spain."

Kate and her late husband carefully planned their move from London, choosing to live near her sister, in Leith. "Actually, moving to Portobello was a no brainer, as I have always wanted to live by the sea," she says.



REMEMBER to plant a few bowls of hyacinths now for that lovely scent around Christmas. Lots of winter shrubs have scent too, so plant something that will encourage you to be outside when the days are colder.

Autumn planting of anything does well, but if you have clay soil, leave planting evergreens until spring, and whether on sand or clay, mulch to retain moisture. Small pots dry out quickly, so try bigger ones for better drought tolerance, as next year may be even drier.

Keep deadheading flowers, especially dahlias and cosmos, which will keep flowering until the first frosts.

Harvest as much as you can, and if you have a glut, share with the local food bank. Collecting seed is also a harvest; wait until seed heads are dry, then put the seeds in paper bags, label and store in airtight jars or similar in the fridge.

When pulling or digging out perennial weeds with tough roots, soak them in a bucket for a few days, then compost. Between now and spring, I like a very cold day to empty the compost heap and spread it on the vegetable patch and around anything newly planted.

UNTIL you are in a wildfire it is difficult to imagine the intensity of the flames and the speed at which they move. This ferocity was brought home a few years ago when I



was evacuated from a villa in the south of France - Dunkirk spirit in the local mairie. We may think that fires like the ones in Australia and California cannot happen here. But they can. Record temperatures and tinder-dry vegetation resulted in houses being consumed by bush fires in Britain.

Major action is needed by government to address the climate emergency - anyone listening? However, that doesn't mean we stop doing the things at a local level such as shopping locally, and walking and cycling. The council's 20 minute neighbourhood initiative is one response and promotes local communities.

There are various groups within Portobello such as PEDAL and Action Porty that contribute to sustainability. Porty Community Energy is another that wishes to promote a transition to a lighter carbon impact. It will be holding an event at the beginning of November which will include information about access to funding, insulation, draughtproofing, double glazing as well as heat pumps and renewable energy. Look out for further information.

you If must drive, then consider joining the Enterprise Car Club. You pay by the hour, so have no maintenance costs to worry about. Many vehicles are hybrid or electric, so are better for the environment. Pick up from a dedicated parking space in locations across Edinburgh, and then return the vehicle when you're finished. You even get free parking in certain parts of the city.

CONNECTING THROUGH SONG

PORTOBELLO Community Choir aims to create community and connect with the world around us through song. We were one of the first choirs to contribute to the Black Lives Matter song commissioning project. FROM THE ARCHIVE

ALL ABOARD THE SKYLARK

IF YOU'RE old enough, you may have memories of sailing aboard Skylark IX, the popular pleasure boat which plied its trade on Portobello Beach in the 1960s. Today, it is under the care of the Skylark IX Recovery Project. The team is keen to hear from anyone who can contribute memories and even photographs or memorabilia to 'Skylark IX Voices', a new living archive of stories of the much-loved vessel. The archive will be a key part of a new heritage attraction and community hub which the project hopes to build in Dumbarton, close to where the boat ended its long working life.

I am Jade West, Community Engagement Lead at the Skylark IX Recovery Project, and we would love to chat to anyone who has a story, long or short, to tell about Skylark and her time at Portobello. intrepid Dunkirk Our 'Little Ship' Skylark IX has such a fabulous history, a twisting story of adventure, wartime service, daring circumnavigation wreckings. AMNESTY - LOCAL NEWS

IT'S ALWAYS gratifying that so many visitors to Portobello's Saturday Market respond to whatever case Amnesty International (AI) Portobello Group highlights at its stall. In August, for instance, more than 90 people signed AI's petition to Turkey's Chief Prosecutor to release the 'Gezi 7' currently facing life and other major prison terms for participating in the mass demonstrations in Istanbul's Gezi Park in 2013.

The civil unrest spread across the country, largely against the government's policies and its oppression of freedom of expression. The seven's leader, philanthropist and human rights campaigner Osman Kavala, was given an aggravated life sentence while the others were each sentenced to 18 years. They were actually acquitted at their first trial but the authorities intervened to enforce sentences for 'attempting to overthrow the government'.

The European Court of Human Rights has ruled that the authorities violated Osman Kavala's right to liberty with the aim of silencing human rights activities. AI is calling for the seven to be freed and considers their unjust convictions emblematic of the deteriorating human rights situation in Turkey.



SOMETIMES NATURE

presents us with opposites that operate within the same habitat, using that landscape in different ways to ensure that they don't compete with each other. Often those alternative takes on the same location are accentuated by wildly contrasting outfits. This is no more obvious than in the case of the stream-dwelling Dipper and Kingfisher.

Both are often seen along the Figgate Burn,

the Dipper being the dowdy, strait-laced, matter-of-fact little brown bird with a white bib, while the Kingfisher hits drag queen extravagance. This translates into hunting techniques, but this is where we shouldn't be fooled by the show.

The Kingfisher perches on a low branch, above the running stream, looking out for small fish. There's a skill to this, taking into account refraction by the water, and once it pinpoints its prey it's all action, diving into the water,

before usually returning to the same perch to bash the capture against it, then swallowing whole. It even manages to orientate sticklebacks so the spines fold flat as the fish goes down.

The Dipper, by contrast, stays closer to the water, preferring protruding rocks as its vantage point. It disappears into the water with the merest of splashes, and makes for the bottom, effectively walking over the


rocky floor, looking for bugs and beasties hiding amongst the stones. Videos of this activity are astonishing to watch.

There is one visible, or rather audible, aspect in which the Dipper definitely has the edge. The blue dart has a rather simple 'beep' call, similar to the cartoon Roadrunner, but the Dipper entertains with an electronic-sounding call that could be straight from a synthesiser.


JOPPA TENNIS
